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Directors/Trustees' Report

for the year ended 31 March 2023

Living Under One Sun Limited ("the charity") is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 26 March 2008 and registered as a charity with the Charity Commission for England and Wales on 24 April 2017. The Directors, who are also the Trustees of the charity, present their independently examined report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2023 and confirm they comply with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011, the charity's constitution and the Charities SORP (FRS102).

1. Objectives and activities

Purposes and Aims

Living Under One Sun Limited's charitable purposes as set out in the objects contained in the articles of association agreed by the Directors on 21 September 2016 are:

- 1. The development of the capacity, skills and leadership abilities of members of the community of, principally but not exclusively, Tottenham and other social and economically disadvantaged areas of the London Borough of Haringey (the 'Area of Benefit') by providing opportunities which they would otherwise be unable to access, in order to work together, learn by experience and recognise their existing skills as assets, to gain confidence in their own abilities and, as a result, help identify and meet their needs and participate more fully in society.
- 2. The promotion of urban regeneration in the Area of Benefit for public benefit and, in particular, local economically or socially disadvantaged residents, by all or any of the following means:
 - the promotion and advancement of physical, mental, social and economic health through healthy living activities, including organic horticulture, food growing, herbal medicine, beekeeping, healthy cooking and eating, sewing, cycling and walking;
 - ii) the promotion of common interests, equality, harmony and social inclusion for the public benefit by the reduction and prevention of social isolation and the celebration of difference and diversity;
 - iii) the relief of unemployment through a range of interventions and pathways, including the provision of work experience for unemployed people, and training and assistance to find employment whether as an employee or on a self-employed basis,

- iv) the relief and prevention of poverty amongst people living within the Area of Benefit;
- v) the protection, conservation or improvement of the environment.
- 3. To further benefit the residents of the Area of Benefit, without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, race or of political, religious or other opinions by associating together the said residents and the local authorities, voluntary and other organisations in a common effort to advance education and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation and leisure time occupation with the objective of improving the conditions of life for the residents.
- 4. To advance any other charitable purposes (according to the law of England and Wales) as the Trustees see fit from time to time.

Our Vision

To live in an inclusive, empowered, socially just, safe and greener neighbourhood.

Our Values

For Living Under One Sun Limited people, places and nature are valued as heritage, assets and solutions for the present and future, with sustainability as a key principle - where sustainability is defined as meeting the needs of the present without compromising the ability of future generations to meet their own needs. Our values are:

Ensuring public benefit

The Directors/Trustees have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning its future activities. In particular, the Directors/Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

Our Approach

Our values guide the delivery of our services and projects in furtherance of our charitable objects. Our approach is welcoming, 'can do', community-led, intergenerational and intercultural, focusing on:

- locally led community projects 'by the community, for the community';
- establishing peer support groups, befriending and advocacy creating and accessing health and well-being projects and services;
- providing community growing spaces and community outreach in neighbourhoods and schools to bring health, well-being and nature closer to communities;
- supporting people to become active, skill up and creating pathways to volunteering, training, qualifications and employment opportunities.

We continue to work productively with a wide range of partners from the public, private and voluntary sectors in innovative ways to add value wherever possible.

2. Achievements and performance

The year for Down Lane Park and the possibility of a permanent community hub

2022/23 was a challenging year for us, beginning with commitment to engage and capacity-build our local community to undertake a 'co-production' journey to plan improvements for Down Lane Park with the Council, including the possibility of a permanent Neighbourhood Community Hub inside the park. During the year much of our time was taken over and our priorities shifted to ensuring commitment from the Council to a permanent community hub in the park – this was successful and a major achievement, especially in these difficult times for local authorities.

The prospect of park improvements and a new Hub had huge implications for the two key stakeholders in the park, Living Under One Sun Limited and Pavilion Nursery, and the building we operate from. There were implications too for the Council's Parks Depot, the facilities and infrastructure in the park, the park entrances and fencing, and the decision to open a 9-metre gate from the Berol Link into the Community Hub gardens.

On top of all this there was also:

- major development proposals for 270 homes on the Ashley Road Depot site on the northern side of the park, also affecting the Harris Academy schools and local residents;
- ongoing major construction of flats and a health centre underway adjacent to the park on the Welbourne Site (renamed Walter Tull House);
- new homes on the adjacent Chesnuts estate; and
- looming demolition at the Ashley House site, to prepare for more new homes.

Living Under One Sun Limited was in the middle of all of this and, with a mandate from the community for our services and the idea of a permanent community hub, so we had to be open and prepared for a wide range of discussions in order to help shape our neighbourhood.

We met these challenges through:

- community outreach
- helping to establish and host two local community forums focused on the park
- supporting the Council's Community Design Group
- working to make wider consultation more inclusive and effective
- building relationships with different stakeholders
- advocating policy and strategy, design requirements and solutions
- attending numerous meetings with partners and groups
- publicising, promoting, and hosting many of the meetings, discussions and events around all these issues, alongside making our own contributions
- having dedicated Directors/Trustees working on design of the new hub and business planning

We helped set up and then host the Down Lane Park User & Community Forum, after previous attempts had failed, then supported the setting up and capacity building of Down Lane Park Young People's Forum - the next level for the local young people's leadership.

We hosted and contributed to the Council's Community Design Group (CDG), set up to steer the co-design of park improvements. The CDG was chaired by two Council Cabinet members for Placemaking & Housebuilding, and Environment and Climate Action - with two young people from our leadership programme working alongside representatives from Disability Action, Healthy Streets, Living Under One Sun Limited, a developer, Council officers from Regeneration and Parks, and the architects; although unfortunately schools, the NHS and local businesses were underrepresented. The CDG organised 4 study visits, local walkabouts, and 12 meetings.

This was an opportunity for Living Under One Sun Limited to learn and contribute in a major way, and assert our demand and vision for a permanent hub - by giving evidence about its uniqueness, its power to generate funds and bring positive activism, green and health and well-being activities, and custodianship of green spaces into the life of our neighbourhood – and gain support along the way from partners, stakeholders and most importantly our local communities.

The process went through several stages of engaging the community, with Living Under One Sun Limited always encouraging different ways the wider community could be more included, in particular young people, people for whom English is not their first language, those with caring responsibilities and new residents, as well as the existing community. While these engagement processes tried to achieve co-production and co-design, this remained challenging and much still needs to be learnt about information and power

sharing. These processes need sensitive and timely communications, and appropriate resources, including multi-lingual outreach and advocacy.

Living Under One Sun Limited also supported Haringey Council, as part of our Memorandum of Understanding, as a partner in the Council's Bid to the Mayor of London's Green and Resilient Spaces Fund for Down Lane Park. This had been unsuccessful in 2022, with the GLA offering the Council £40,000 for capacity building to prepare a bid for the second round. This new bid was duly submitted in February 2023 – and was successful, securing funding of £750,000 for Down Lane Park improvements and neighbourhood engagement.

Alongside the park improvements and new community hub discussions, Living Under One Sun Limited's ongoing and growing activities included community development work, building positive neighbourhood action on health and well-being, cost of living support, sports and recreation, gardening and food growing, sewing and upcycling, and pathways to green jobs and enterprise.

With all this activity, huge pressure was placed on the team and the Directors/Trustees, with more volunteering hours and expertise required to respond to our duty of care on our main objectives, raise funds for free frontline services, continue with strategic partnership work on key issues like health and well-being, welcoming refugees and migrants, distributing the Household Support Fund, engaging young people with support young people to be leaders in our community, all alongside reducing violence and the hostile environment in our neighbourhood.

The impact of 13 tower blocks with an estimated 3,000 new flats and 10,000 new residents in our neighbourhood brought, and is bringing, opportunities to welcome new neighbours, while at the same time there is anxiety around social integration and cohesion within such a fast changing environment, with significant physical disruption. Having to navigate their daily lives through these changes, many existing residents felt unsafe, unengaged and unwelcome in what, to some, was becoming an unrecognisable neighbourhood.

As well as working on the planning and design of new improvements, and having secured community and Council support for a new permanent community hub, we also began preparing and writing a 5-year Business Plan for the new Hub.

During the year there were some tensions and frustrations which we worked to resolve:

- The gate from Berol Link into the Community Hub was due to be opened at the end of the building contract. However, the health and safety of the enclosed Hub garden was risk-assessed, and the community won the support from the Council and the developer to keep the gate shut until the new community hub and gardens are built.
- Many young people using the park felt that the funding allocated to the Homecooked programme for Tottenham Hale did not have much strategic impact and engagement with them or with the life of the park. Despite this large amount of funding for young

people and engaging and reducing violence, young people didn't feel it contributed to the design of the park. With the support of Living Under One Sun Limited, the young people got engaged in outreach and the Council's park user survey, with several being trained to advocate for the needs and aspirations of all young people into the design and sustainability of our neighbourhood park.

• Processes around improvements and shaping our neighbourhood brought out some underlying tensions and issues, and highlighted the need for expertise and appropriate community development, based on an understanding of community politics by all parties, in particular the Council. It highlighted how quickly things could go wrong when not handled well by skilled project managers. Potentially volatile situations need sensitive and timely information-sharing from across the spectrum of needs and aspirations, to avoid conflicts and resolve them as and when they occur, and to reduce confusion and alienation amongst those who feel their voice is not heard, or feel 'what's the point' – and the Council was tested on this.

During this year we became nationally recognised as a welcoming hub, hosting several major planning strategy session and conferences on migrants, refugees and asylum seekers, challenging the hostile environment, alongside regular Welcome Hub sessions with the Council's Resettlement Team giving support to local refugee and migrant communities as part of the Haringey Welcome partnership.

Key activities and outcomes in 2022/23 - making a difference

Our Theory of Change and Business Plan include eight key outcomes, building community wealth, social value and each contributing to our vision of making a happier, more inclusive, socially just, equal, empowered and greener, lower carbon neighbourhood:

- Supporting Inclusion, talking isolation, building cohesion
- Vibrant and safe spaces available to the whole community
- Local people influencing decisions and responding to issues with social action
- Reduced crime and people feeling safer in their community
- Safe, well-used green and public spaces
- Collective action to address climate change
- Increasing household income and reducing poverty
- More capacity to deliver, unlocking partnerships, community skills, assets, ideals and strategy

Some of the key activities and outcomes Living Under One Sun Limited has delivered in 2022/23 are set out below:

- Providing an active Community Hub, Café and Gardens, creating an essential lively, visible and friendly social space in the Park with a wide range of regular activities in the Hub or just outside the Hub, to encourage use of the park: dance, yoga, running, walking groups, cycling, wheelchair basketball for all the family, football, multi sports, hula hoops, skipping, gardening, sewing, family events, festivals, e-sports events, cost of living support, civil and housing rights support, enterprise advice and support, green initiatives and climate action, parents and carers groups, a youth friendship hub with after-school homework and football clubs, volunteering and training opportunities and pathways to employment.
- Delivering holiday activities and food programmes with free lunches in April, May, summer and October 2022 and in February 2023, including multi sports, wheelchair basketball, arts and crafts, gardening—reaching and benefiting over 500 local residents.
- Supporting 35 residents as community leaders, including 10 young people, to deliver or help to deliver projects and activities, and shape their neighbourhood. Of these 78% were from BAME backgrounds, 62% were women, 28% young people and 8% from the LGBT+ community.
- Supporting residents with pathways to training and employment, to complete a range of
 placements, training and qualifications, and created or retained full time, part time or

sessional jobs for 41 local residents. Of these 88% were from BAME backgrounds, 76% were women, 20% young people, 7% from the LGBT+ community and 7% were residents with disabilities.

- Supporting residents facing hardship with the rising costs of living through distributing £4,170 cash and vouchers from the Haringey Household Support Fund to 74 local households (112 local residents) in March 2023. Of these 93% were from minority or marginalised communities, 65% with no recourse to public funds, 13% including a family member with a disability, and 20% were woman-headed single parent families.
- Maintaining an ongoing outreach stall on Wednesdays and Saturdays outside the Hub, including food top ups and energy advice, reaching an average of 20 residents per week.
- Providing 2 days a month of support to residents on social enterprise and employability at the Hub.
- Hosting and supporting a Youth Friendship Hub, run by young people, initially including after-school and weekend activities and football clubs. In March this group took a further strategic step forward supported by Living Under One Sun Limited, setting up a Young People's Forum with a constitution, officers and a planning group, to give young people a stronger voice and running a programme of half term activities. Living Under One Sun Limited also led girls empowerment activities with We Move Under One Sun through dance and also leadership development.

- support, playing sports, sharing skills, and knowing their community better. Feedback from the 'We Move' Girls Empowerment Group was similar.
- Supporting local DJs to hold and promote events including an Afro-Latin House Music event and a Grime and Grind Event, and two young people to develop and produce their t-shirt designs.
- Enabling people's experience, history/herstory and heritages to be voiced and celebrated –through storytelling, community cultural events and showcasing, including:
 - supporting, celebrating and bringing together older and newer migrant and refugee communities, with existing communities in a Festival of Resistance to the Hostile Environment with Haringey Council and the Joint Council for Welfare of Immigrants (19/06/22) attended by 220 people, and a Festival of Healing (25/06/22) during Refugee Week attended by 400 local people
 - holding 5 Family Fiestas, joint events with Wards Corner Community Plan and attended by 150-350 local residents each time, with a strong focus on our Latin American communities
- Continuing to raise the awareness of more than 200 residents per year on the dangers of climate change, the value of Nature and biodiversity and the need for action/behaviour change through practical neighbourhood initiatives, including:
 - cycling and cycle repair classes and sessions (at least 100 residents)
 - Organic gardening and food growing at the Hub and Allotment
 - park improvements discussions
 - issues of poor air quality near to Monument Way and south side of park,
 - environmental education talks and sessions for residents
 - eco arts and crafts sessions
 - Little Buds nature session for under 4s (started April 23)
 - recycling of cardboard and waste, including composting, plus rainwater collection
 - use and value of Felix Project surplus food from supermarkets
 - our food top up stall
 - energy saving measures and advice given to residents with Household Support Fund
 - setting up our LoCaL3 project
 - upcycling and re-use of materials in our sewing project

- community involvement and representations in having and designing a new sustainable community hub
- Establishing new partnerships with national environmental charity Feedback Global, with Natural England, and with the universities of Greenwich (on aquaponics and nonsoil growing) and Kingston, on nature based integration through art with new and existing residents.
- Constructively commenting on the Council's Down Lane Park Management Plan with suggested improvements. And contributing to the Council securing a Green Flag Award for the park.
- Supporting residents to engage with the planning system on the proposed Gate into the Hub gardens, the Berol Yard development, and the Ashley Road Development.
- Making an innovative Pineapple Placemaking award-winning partnership with private developer Way of Life to link new residents with the existing community – including a short video on Living Under One Sun Limited - see this link: https://www.wayoflife.com/journal/community/community-life-living-under-one-sun
- Commencing delivery of LoCaL3, a low carbon industries feasibility study and training scheme for residents, securing funding from Haringey Community Carbon fund.

- Hosting and supporting a 2 day national strategy event with 'Patients not Passports'
 members and a national conference of the 'Anti-Deportations and Anti-Detentions
 campaign'.
- Helping to steer and contribute to London Metropolitan University's research report on 'Afghan migrants in London: accessing support in hostile times' with recommendations for government, local authorities, agencies and community organisations.
- Maintaining diverse income streams, including increasing our Hub and Café hiring and catering income and securing over £60,000 of donated/in-kind goods and services.
- The Hub continuing to be designated and used as safe space for women and girls, with this year including a Council-led consultation on how to make the park safer and for girls and women and more geared to the activities they want.

Organisationally, Living Under One Sun Limited has strengthened and refreshed its Board, recruiting seven new Directors/Trustees early in 2023, including two aged under 18, two from the Spanish-speaking Latin American community, one with significant local authority and programme experience, one with 40+ years frontline NHS experience, and two with both academic/research and practical experience with community organisations. All have relevant and valuable lived experience. Nine Directors/Trustees (82%) live or work locally, and a majority are women and from Black and Minority ethnic and migrant communities.

Many thanks to two Directors/Trustees who moved on this year after many years service, Liz Kelly and Natalie Curd. We are pleased that both are continuing with Living Under One Sun Limited as advisers.

Living Under One Sun Limited also added three other specialist advisers to our team, covering environmental and public health, sustainable neighbourhoods, business and business planning, organisational development, and young people.

Our second Social Value Calculation

Living Under One Sun Limited's Business Plan sets a target of creating £500,000 of social value per year. Using a set of Social Value Portal Measures, in 2022/23 (our second year of full SV calculation) created an estimated £594,000 in social value through maintaining and creating jobs, social innovation to improve local skills and employment; and social action to create healthier and more resilient communities, safeguarding the environment and responding to the climate emergency; carbon savings; and support and advice to SMEs.

This social value includes delivering 5,020 hours of volunteering with an estimated value of £86,328.

Through residents getting involved in activities, making connection and friendships we reduced social isolation, saving an estimated £370,000 year for local services.

Future plans

Living Under One Sun Limited remains committed to free frontline grassroots services and developing community-led projects, including free holiday programmes and a range of regular weekly activities, together with progressing key strategic initiatives, including the funding and development of the new Community Hub and Gardens and the Green and Resilient Spaces Programme for Down Lane Park.

Tottenham and Haringey will have a unique and special asset, a **viable and sustainable** Community-led Green Learning Hub, Café and Gardens in a new and improved Down Lane Park, serving as a vibrant, safe and welcoming community space in the heart of Tottenham Hale for individuals, families and community groups, for existing and new residents of all ages, genders, faiths, cultures and backgrounds, to come together and connect. A space to share skills and stories and socialise, to develop and deliver activities, to access services, learn and find pathways to training and employment, shape their neighbourhood – and find fun, friendship and fitness too!

During 2023/24 we have been and will be:

 Preparing and submitting the Business plan for new Community Hub (submitted May 2023), securing Council approval and selecting the right partners to work with us

- Contributing to the detailed design of the new Hub and gardens
- Working for Council approval and funding of the park improvements and new Hub (secured June and July 2023)
- Recruiting the Living Under One Sun Limited Operations Manager (achieved September 2023)
- Increasing core funding bids for key management staff prior to moving into the new Hub
- As the demand for hires and events builds up, restructuring and training local people in new Café operations and building an events team
- Strengthening relationships with the NHS and GPs to work on residents' long term health conditions and child weight management
- Building on partnership with Haringey Learns to outreach our community to engage with
 positive free learning opportunities, expanding this to prepare for bid to Mayor of
 London's Skills and Employment Community Outreach Programme.
- Building the capacity of the Young People's Forum and their leadership, helping them to liaise with the Council and the Park User& Community Forum
- Reviewing and revising the Down Lane Park Green and Resilient Spaces Delivery Plan
 with the Council and GLA, and working with London Metropolitan University on the
 community-based evaluation of the Green and Resilient Spaces programme
- Supporting our park to achieve Green Flag awards through community engagement and development
- Designing and delivering 13 weeks community-led training and capacity building around no-soil food growing and aquaponics for LoCaL3
- Strengthening new found partnerships with nation environmental charity Feedback Global, and Natural England, local group Bees for Refugees and renewing our partnership with the Lee Valley Park Authority at the Community Allotment
- Continuing to support local residents associations, and the Down Lane Park Community
 & User Forum
- Providing a free, welcoming, warm and safe space for under 5s and their care givers, indoors and outdoors
- Continuing to provide services and a venue to support and welcome refugee and migrant communities

- Continuing to provide a platform for local DJs, artists and chefs to bring genres of music, poetry and a global kitchen to the community hub, supporting and promoting them
- Developing and supporting a community of artists, photographers, sculptors who will influence and strengthen positive and inclusive community activism and culture around climate action
- Continuing to up-cycle materials for building structures and projects at the Hub for growing microgreens and the classroom and sheds at the community allotment
- Maintaining our strong referral systems with a range of agencies
- Empowering more residents to feel connected and making a positive contribution to their neighbourhood
- Continuing to leverage in kind contributions of materials, resources and expertise to continue supporting a community presence and free activities

4. Financial Review

Living Under One Sun Limited's total income including the value of pro bono work and inkind donations in 2022/23 amounted to £245,950, a 29% reduction compared to 2021/22 (£348,431) mainly caused by a reduction in grants and commissioned services income. Total expenditure remained similar at £268,298 compared to £265,859 in 2021/22.

Principal funding sources

During the year our principal funding sources were grants, donations and in-kind contributions from a range of sources, as well as income generated from activities. We generated unrestricted income through venue hires and catering, Café and local produce sales, training provision and support for community events.

The charity received significant support from the London Borough of Haringey in the form of grants and project funding as well as in-kind support.

Reserves policy and position

The Directors/Trustees are conscious of the charity's requirements for adequate reserves to maintain liquidity and respond to unexpected events. The Living Under One Sun Limited reserves policy states that the unrestricted funds held by the charity should cover between 3 and 6 months' of budgeted expenditure to meet any unforeseen expenditure that may occur, and to permit sufficient time for restructuring in the event of any significant drops in funding. At the end of the 2022/23 financial year, the charity held £115,216 in unrestricted reserves (increased from £107,926 in 2021/22) alongside £1,103 designated for future depreciation costs and £36,920 in carried-forward restricted and designated project funds (compared to £62,101 in March 2022). Total net assets thus amounted to £153,239 (2021/22: £175,587).

Risk Management

The Directors/Trustees regularly review of the major risks to which the charity is exposed. Where appropriate, systems or procedures have been established to mitigate the risks the charity faces. In particular, all our policies and procedures were updated and implemented to take account of Covid-19 requirements, and have since been reviewed. We have secured professional support to develop a robust business plan for the next five years 2024-2029.

The Directors/Trustees recognise that the charity is dependent on receiving grant funding, donations, contracts and commissions to be able to continue many of its activities. The Directors/Trustees expect that current and future fundraising efforts will generate sufficient funds to enable the charity to continue operations and have prepared a budget on this basis. Expenditure will be closely monitored to ensure the charity can continue its operations for the foreseeable future.

5. Structure, Governance and Management

Living Under One Sun Limited ("the charity") is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 26 March 2008 and registered with the Charity Commission for England and Wales on 24 April 2017. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association as amended on 21 September 2016, which set out the objects and powers of the charity. In the event of the charity being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Organisational Structure

The charity is governed by a board of Directors/Trustees who meet at least quarterly (generally monthly), and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. The charity's Directors/Trustees comprise a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity and local residents. Day to day management of the charity is delegated to the Chief Executive Officer, who also acts as the company secretary.

Appointment and Induction of Directors/Trustees

Directors/Trustees may be appointed by resolution at any general meeting of the Directors/Trustees, including but not limited to the Annual General Meeting. At the Annual General Meeting one third of Directors/Trustees by rotation must retire from office, as well as any Directors/Trustees appointed in a general meeting held since the previous Annual General Meeting, but all retiring Directors/Trustees can be reappointed.

New Directors/Trustees receive an induction pack comprising the articles of association, the most recent financial statements, current policies and procedures, and other information about the key activities of the charity. Directors/Trustees also become familiar with the practical work of the charity through visiting and volunteering in events and activities with the Chief Executive Officer and team. The charity provides access to relevant training for Directors/Trustees where appropriate.

Notes to the Accounts For the year ended 31 March 2023

1. Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year.

Basis of preparation and assessment of going concern

The accounts (financial statements) have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2020) and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity and a small entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Directors/Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Funds structure and accounting

Restricted grants and donations are available for the charity's use only in accordance with the terms under which, and for the purposes which, the funds were donated to the charity.

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Directors/Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.

Income recognition

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Grants and donations are included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable.

Investment income is included when receivable.

Donated services and facilities

In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), the general volunteer time of the charity is not recognised. The Directors/Trustees' annual report provides more information about the contribution of volunteers.

Donated professional services and donated facilities which meet the three criteria of entitlement, probability and measurability as set out in the SORP are recognised as income, at the value to the charity (which would be no more than market rate); and a corresponding amount is then recognised as expenditure in the period of receipt. Donated goods are recognised as donations income.

Notes to the Accounts For the year ended 31 March 2023

1. Accounting policies (continued)

Expenditure recognition

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Where expenditure includes VAT which can only be partially recovered, the irrecoverable VAT is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and fundraising trading costs.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs comprise those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory requirements of the charity and include the independent examination fees and costs linked to the strategic management of the charity.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the statement of financial activities on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. floor area or estimated usage, as set out in Note 3 and 4.

Tangible fixed assets and deprecation

Assets with a cost of up to £1,000 are expensed. Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is calculated so as to write down to estimated residual value the cost of all other tangible fixed assets over their estimated useful lives as follows:

Improvements to leasehold property: 25% per annum on cost

Other equipment: 33% per annum on cost

Leasing

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the statement of financial activities as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the schemes.

Restricted funds

City Bridge Trust: London Community Response Fund

The London Community Response Fund was administered by City Bridge Trust, awarding grants from various funders to help London charities respond to the pandemic. In Wave 5, Living Under One Sun Limited received a City Bridge Trust grant for core costs, in order to resume activities at the Living Under One Sun Community Hub and Café.

Greater London Authority

The GLA funded capital works to create and improve the Living Under One Sun Community Hub and Café; the majority of the expenditure was capitalised, so this is the depreciation reserve and charges.

LBH Business Planning Grant

This grant supports the Living Under One Sun business planning process.

Household Support Fund

The London Borough of Haringey gave a share of the Government Household Support Fund to Living Under One Sun to administer and distribute to local residents and families experiencing hardship due to the cost of living crisis at the end of both the 2021/22 and 2022/23 financial years.

LoCal3 Carbon Reduction Grant

This grant was to support sustainable horticulture, particularly microgreens-growing and hydroponics.

Community Energy London

Community Energy London provide a small amount of funding and some radiator reflector panels for distribution to local residents experiencing energy poverty.

Tudor Trust

This three-year grant funds core salaries and running costs.
