Some Year 6 pupils also took the Eucharist for the first time at school.


Year 3

In Year 3, we have been engaged in our new project, 'Through the Ages'. The project primarily focuses on learning about the prehistoric era and how people used to live in the past.

In Art, we have been looking at various prehistoric pottery and Bell Beaker pots that were used during the prehistoric era.

Pupils had an opportunity to look closely and sketch the pots using the various sketching techniques that they have learnt in class. Following this, the children used clay to model and recreate their own version of the Bell Beaker pots!

It has been wonderful to see the children so focused and involved in their art lessons!







To investigate our current Topic of 'Invasion', Year 4 had an exciting trip to The British Museum to explore Ancient Civilisations.

We were intrigued by the amazing Roman artefacts the museum had, for example Roman coins. It was fascinating to observe and consider its link to our topic as Britain was invaded after the Romans left.

We compared how ancient Roman coins are different from modern British coins and used our mathematical knowledge of Roman numerals to unravel the mysterious numbers on the coins.

Year 5 visit wonderful ceramics!



Did you know the Victoria and Albert museum has one of the most comprehensive and important collections of Chinese art outside East Asia, with pieces dating from 3000 BC to the present day?

During the trip, Year 5 were in role as art detectives. They navigated their way round the museum looking for primary source artefacts from the Chinese Dynasties.

One particular item was searched for high and low! A Taotie vase from the Jingdezhen dynasty.

To the delight of all pupils, a big cheer was heard when they finally discovered the vase on a very high shelf amongst all the ceramics!



Taotie

A taotie is a gluttonous creature in Chinese mythology, which is always hungry no matter how much it eats. Its name translates to 'legendary voracious beast'. Images of taotie appear on ancient Chinese bronze artefacts, such as masks and ritual vessels called dings. It is unclear why the people of the Shang Dynasty used the taotie motif. It could have symbolised greed, warned people against seeking wealth and power or helped priests and shamans to communicate with dead ancestors during religious rituals.

Learning to Learn Week:

Our first week back focused on revisiting key skills in reading, writing and mathematics that the children had learnt in Year 5. We read and understood our school vision, values, school prayer and behaviour policy. We also learnt how the 4 Rs help us to develop our learning muscles – please ask your children what these are to see if they remember!



Puzzie time


Add up to 20
