
The Easter Story

Christians believe that the resurrection of Jesus is part of God's plan for salvation.



YEAR 3 TRIP - NATURAL HISTORY MUSEUM






This month, our Year 3 pupils embarked on an educational journey to the Natural History Museum in London. This excursion provided an excellent opportunity for us to delve deeper into our current topic while reinforcing our previous learning. The children were particularly captivated by the volcanoes and earthquakes exhibition, where they engaged in interactive activities to comprehend the causes and effects of these natural phenomena. The children also had the opportunity to observe the heat suit worn by volcanologists during their research expeditions! Some children even said that it looked like an astronaut suit!

Additionally, we had the privilege of admiring Mary Anning's remarkable fossil discoveries, including the awe-inspiring plesiosaur and ichthyosaur. It was fascinating to note that Mary Anning was only 12 years old when she made her initial fossil discovery! Witnessing the significance of these fossils first-hand left the children in utter amazement.



YEAR 4



In science, Year 4 completed several different experiments using: Boomwhackers of different lengths, plastic and glass water bottles with varying amounts of water, a guitar and thick/thin elastic bands. We were intrigued to discover how features of an object affect the pitch of the sound it makes. In our books, we wrote our results, finding that the shortest Boomwhacker had the highest pitch, the plastic and glass bottles with the least amount of water had the lowest pitch, the first string on the guitar had the highest pitch and the thickest elastic band string had the lowest pitch.

D is for Dangers R is for Response A for Airway B for Breathing C is for CPR.

The mnemonic above is so important in saving lives, as we found out this month, when a first aider from Croydon Schools Sports Partnership visited our Year 5 classes.

The instructor, Pearl, ensured that we were given a unique opportunity to be mini-medics. As mini medics in training, we learnt what's included in a first aid kit as well as what shouldn't be in there. Who knew that triangular bandages

(for slings or strapping) could be so important?

We learnt a variety of ways to keep ourselves safe as well as to keep others safe. Pearl gave us dummies so we could learn how to do CPR and how to prevent choking, and we all took turns to practise our newly-learnt skills. What is a first aid lesson without learning how to use a defibrillator? This is such an invaluable device that, in short, is used to give patients a controlled electric shock to their heart to try and get a normal heart beat or rhythm back again. We also learnt how to treat wounds and shock!

Pearl told us that 'What3Words' is an app to help identify where a patient or casualty is, so that they can quickly benefit from the assistance of an ambulance crew. Overall, it was a great learning experience. We now feel ready to use our skills to help someone who's been hurt, though we would prefer it, if we all kept ourselves safe.



YEAR 5- LOCAL HISTORY TRIP



This month, Year 5 were joined by the charity organisation 'Proud Places'.

Proud Places is a London-wide engagement programme inspiring young people with the world around them. The scheme invites young people behind the scenes at heritage restoration projects, to learn new skills and discuss themes related to their local area.

The history lesson began at the water fountain at the end of Surrey Street market (it will be restored this year by stone masons) and ended with Fiona (the local Market Inspector) playing a game of history Bingo with the children as well as giving them vital historic information about the market and the traders. Our pupils really enjoyed the hands on outdoor learning experience

On Wednesday 21st February, the children in Year 6 enjoyed a thoroughly entertaining educational visit to the Science Museum, South Kensington, as part of our Frozen Kingdoms topic learning. In order for the children to better understand the landscape and wildlife of Antarctica, the main focus of our visit was to watch a 'BBC Earth' film entitled 'Antarctica 3D'. Due to immense size of the screen, and the 3D effects (which were amazingly realistic), everyone was enthralled by the majestic polar animals and how they manage to survive in such a harsh, unforgiving environment – temperatures regularly fall to as low as -80 Celsius, and night-time can last for months!

The film, which was narrated by Benedict Cumberbatch, also reminded the pupils about the negative impact that humans have had on the Antarctic, which include industrial-scale whale hunting and the melting of glaciers and ice-shelves caused by global warming. Global warming is believed to be linked to people burning too many fossil fuels.


After watching the film, the children enjoyed eating their packed lunches and were taken on a quick tour to other parts of the museum by their class teachers. Everyone enjoyed the trip, and we made it back to school just in time for home time.

Please note that the Science Museum is free to enter [donations welcome, not required] and is a fascinating place for children, and adults, to visit. Admission to the IMAX cinema costs extra. Located close by are also the Natural History Museum and the Victoria & Albert Museum (V&A). Why not pay them a visit during the Easter holidays, or on a wet weekend?
