### **Year 3 Learning**

This month, the Year 3s visited Cannizaro Park in Wimbledon to consolidate our learning on plants, our science topic for this half term. The day prior to the visit, the children learnt about the different parts of a flower. The park's lovely herb and flower garden was open for exploration, and the children were excited to showcase their understanding of the topic and identify different types of plants they recognised.

Despite the warm temperatures, the children had a brilliant time! Cannizaro Park is a wonderful place to visit- perhaps somewhere you could explore over the summer holiday!

### Year 4 Learning

In science, Year 4 completed several different experiments using: Boomwhackers of different lengths, plastic and glass water bottles with varying amounts of water, a guitar and thick/thin elastic bands. We were intrigued to discover how features of an object affect the pitch of the sound it makes. In our books, we recorded our results, finding that the shortest Boomwhacker had the highest pitch, the plastic and glass bottles with the least amount of water had the lowest pitch, the first string on the guitar had the highest pitch and the thickest elastic band string had the lowest pitch.









#### Year 5 visited Park Hill allotments for the very first time! Here is an account of the visit by Year 5.

As we entered the allotment we were greeted by a gardener. Jane told us some very interesting facts. First, she explained there were 40 plots and that every owner on the allotment 'works with nature'. Jane also explained that they had a Bug Hotel, to ensure all the good bugs could stay and be protected. She said, 'The hotel is their home, it was built so the bugs could eat their food and be safe.





After that, Jane took us to her plot (she rents it for £1.20 per week). We all thought that was very reasonable. On Jane's plot there were raspberries, sweet peppers, potatoes, butter beans and thyme and mint. We even got to hold and smell them.

It was really fun to learn outside, thank you to all the Year 5 teachers for giving us a great experience!

### Year 5 spend the day in Greenwich!


## Have you ever wondered where the Meridian line is in the U.K?

#### Well, Year 5 visited it last week!

The meridian line in Greenwich represents the Prime Meridian of the world, Longitude Zero (0° 0' 0"). Every place on the Earth is measured in terms of its angle east or west from this line.

Since 1884, the Prime Meridian has served as the reference point for Greenwich Mean Time (GMT).

#### Year 6 Learning

**Community Engagement** 

In the first week of term, each of our Year 6 classes took turns to visit central Croydon's shopping area in order to conduct research about the local population's religious beliefs, and to find out what foods they traditionally ate to celebrate religious holidays.

This was part of our 'Faith in the Community' learning and entailed the children thinking carefully about the questions they would ask.

The children's presence in the high street was well received, with most people asked to complete the questionnaire willing to spare five minutes to talk with the children. Several members of the public approached staff (who were keeping a close eye on proceedings) and complimented the children for their politeness and showing an interest in the local population's faiths.

The children thoroughly enjoyed the experience of interviewing members of the public and were almost reluctant to return to school, even though it was nearing lunchtime!

Once back in the classrooms, the results of the surveys were compiled, analysed and discussed. The children then went on to plan a menu for a community feast that contains dishes which all sections of the community can enjoy.

From Wednesday 3rd July, through to Friday 5th July, about half of our Year 6 pupils were fortunate enough to experience a two-night trip to PGL's 'Marchants Hill' outdoor activity centre which is located in the countryside just south of Guildford. 

### MATHS

There has been good news for Maths in our school this month.

Approximately 57% of the Year 4 children (this means 1 out of every 2 children) scored 100% on their Multiplication Test Check and a large number of children in Year 6 (67%) achieved or exceeded the expected standard for Key Stage 2 Mathematics.

Well done, children! All your hard work has paid off. However, we, as a school, will continue to aim higher as we go along our learning journey.

#### MATHS STRATEGY OF THE MONTH

We can represent one whole (1) as any fraction by making the numerator and the denominator the same, for example, 1= 2/2 or 16/16 or 43/43 or any number/same number.

This is very helpful in adding or subtracting a fraction to or from 1.

For example: 
$$1 + \frac{3}{4} = \frac{4}{4} + \frac{3}{4} = \frac{7}{4}$$
 and  $1 - \frac{3}{4} = \frac{4}{4} - \frac{3}{4} = \frac{1}{4}$
