Appendix II

Standardized Place Names

When indicating your place of residence in your application, it is crucial that you use the standard spelling and format recognized internationally. This helps to avoid confusion and ensures that all communication reaches you in a timely manner.

To deduce the standardized place name for your residence, follow the instructions below:

- Country: Use the official English name as listed by the United Nations. Do not use informal or colloquial names. For example, use "Russian Federation" instead of "Russia".
- State/Province/Region: If your country is divided into states, provinces, or similar divisions, use the full, unabbreviated name. Do not use any abbreviations or colloquial names.
- City: The city name should be spelled exactly as it is commonly known in English. If there are variations or alternate spellings, use the one that is most widely accepted and recognized.
- Street Name: Write the complete name of the street, including any type, e.g., St., Ave., Blvd. Do not abbreviate these terms.
- Building Name/Number: If applicable, include the full name of the building or the number. Do not use any abbreviations or shorthand. If there are any suite or apartment numbers, these should be indicated using the standard "#".
- Postal Code: Include the full postal code, using the format specific to your country. This is usually a combination of letters and numbers.

Please note that failure to use the correct, standardized place names can result in delays in your application processing and will deduct points off of your final application score (see Appendix IV). Always double-check to ensure you have spelled and formatted everything correctly.

Appendix IV

Calculation of Application Score

The Miskatonic University Application Score is a comprehensive and multifaceted tool that we utilize to evaluate the competencies and aptitude of each applicant in an objective and holistic manner. This appendix explains how the application score is calculated, and what components of your application are factored into this score.

Each section of your application is associated with a specific weightage, which is then calculated in conjunction with several complex algorithms to derive your Application Score. The weights for each section of your application are as follows:

- Section A Personal Information: This is allocated a weightage of 3.1%.
- Section B Family Background: This section holds a weightage of 6.9%.
- Section C Academic Records: This important part of your application carries a weightage of 29.5%.
- Section D Extracurricular Achievements: This section holds a weightage of 23.5%.
- Section E Essay Responses: This section, showcasing your personality and perspectives, holds a weightage of 12%.
- Section F Letter of Recommendation: This holds a weightage of 25%.

The weightages given to each section are then used in combination with the assessment algorithms, which include variables such as the Farnsworth Constant (k), the Euler's Number (e), and the Binary Constant (z). The algorithms are as follows:

For Sections A and B:

Score = (Weightage / 100) x [((Number of characters in all answers / Number of questions answered) x k) / (Number of questions not answered + e)]

For Sections C and D:

Score = (Weightage / 100) x [((Number of activities or courses listed / Total possible activities or courses) x k) / (Number of activities or courses not listed + e)]

For Sections E and F:

Score = (Weightage / 100) x [((Number of positive adjectives / Total number of adjectives) x k) / (Number of negative adjectives + e)]

Where:

k = Farnsworth Constant (1.337)

e = Euler's Number (2.71828)

z = Number of zeros in the binary representation of the number of the page where the appendix is listed.

Please note that for the essay section, "positive" and "negative" adjectives are determined based on the sentiments expressed in the context of your essay.

The scores from each section are then added together to get your total Application Score. This score will be used to determine if you will be invited for an interview.

While this scoring process might seem complex, rest assured that it has been developed with meticulous care to ensure fairness and objectivity in our admissions decisions. Each and every application received is subjected to this thorough evaluation process to ensure that the best and brightest minds get the opportunity to study at Miskatonic University.

Appendix VI

Application Process for Non-Recognized Territories

Applicants from territories not officially recognized by Miskatonic University according to Appendix I are nonetheless invited to apply. We acknowledge potential pioneers of knowledge can be found everywhere. This guide has been specifically designed for such applicants.

1. Address Formatting:

Address sections in the application form should be filled as per the following format:

- · Name by which your governing regime refers to the unrecognized territory of your residence
- Full name of the Head of State or Chief of the unrecognized territory
- · Regional or local authority, if any
- · Settlement or community name
- · Specific locality, neighborhood, or street name
- · Residential number, apartment, or suite, if applicable
- Any additional information required for the mail to reach you directly
- · Longitude and latitude of your residence

For example, "The Moon, Luna City, Crater Lane, Dome 42, 0.6463° N, 23.4723° E".

2. Supplementary Documentation:

Along with your application, you are required to submit:

- Letter of reference from a local community leader or a recognized figure within your unrecognized territory, detailing your contribution to your local community
- A verified document stating the population of your unrecognized territory
- Three copies of a map of your unrecognized territory, marked with your place of residence
- A history of the unrecognized territory, a minimum of 1000 words
- A short essay titled "Why My Unrecognized Territory Deserves Recognition", a minimum of 500 words (please refer to Appendix VIII)

3. Telephone Number Formatting:

All phone numbers must be prefaced with the country code (+666). This will signal to our admissions team that the applicant hails from a territory not recognized by Miskatonic University.

Format your phone number as:

- Country code: (+666)
- Main phone number: (Your local telephone number)
- Name by which your governing regime refers to the unrecognized territory of your residence: (To be written in brackets)
- GMT time zone difference of your residence: (To be written after the country name)

For example, if your telephone number is 123456789 and you live in "The Moon", you should write: (+666) 123456789 (The Moon, GMT +14).

Please adhere to these guidelines diligently to ensure your application is processed correctly. Miskatonic University welcomes diversity in all forms and encourages students from non-recognized territories to apply. Miskatonic University's Mascot Trivia

Appendix VIII

Personal Essay Guidelines

Here are some detailed guidelines to help you craft your personal essay:

- Length: Your essay should be between 1,000 to 1,200 words. Any essay that falls below or exceeds this word count will be considered non-compliant and may not be reviewed.
- **Structure**: Your essay should have a clear structure including an introduction, body, and conclusion. The introduction should catch the reader's interest, the body should develop your ideas and insights, and the conclusion should bring closure to your discussion.
- Content: Your essay must address the following prompts:
 - a. Describe a significant experience, achievement, risk you have taken, or ethical dilemma you have faced and its impact on you.
 - b. Discuss an issue of personal, local, national, or international concern and its importance to vou.
 - c. Explain why Miskatonic University is a good fit for your academic and personal growth, and how you would contribute to our university community.
- **Style**: Write in the first person and make sure your voice shines through. Your essay should be more than just an enumeration of facts or a chronology of events. Instead, it should reveal your thought process and reflect your personality.
- Originality: Your essay must be original work. Plagiarism will result in your application being rejected.
- **Proofread**: Make sure your essay is free from spelling and grammar errors. Also, pay attention to sentence structure and the flow of your paragraphs. A well-written essay leaves a positive impression.

Remember, the personal essay is your chance to let the admissions committee know who you are beyond your grades and test scores. Use this opportunity wisely to highlight your strengths, passions, and ambitions. Happy writing!

Appendix IX

School Ranking Determination

Ranking a school is a multifaceted process involving numerous dimensions of measurement. Miskatonic University uses the following convoluted, complex, and seemingly nonsensical process to determine school ranking:

1. Factor 1: Weighted Curriculum Score

To calculate this score, we consider the breadth and depth of a school's curriculum. The formula for this score is as follows:

Weighted Curriculum Score = (Number of AP/IB courses offered * 2) + (Number of Advanced Honors courses * 1.5) + (Number of Standard Courses * 1) - (Number of Remedial Courses * 2)

2. Factor 2: School Resources

A subjective score out of 10, determined by a panel of experts who assess the quality and accessibility of school resources such as libraries, labs, arts facilities, sports facilities, etc. all in the order of the school's establishment date.

3. Factor 3: Teacher-Student Ratio

The number of teachers per student is calculated, then multiplied by the number of total students, then the result is divided by the square root of the school's establishment year.

4. Factor 4: Alumni Success

Another subjective score out of 10, based on the school's reputation and the success of its alumni in various fields. This score is calculated by the panel of experts on the 29th of February each year.

5. Factor 5: Student Diversity

A score out of 10 based on the school's commitment to diversity, including but not limited to, the diversity of its student body and faculty, the diversity of the courses offered, and the school's anti-discrimination policies. This score is calculated by multiplying the diversity ratio with the product of the establishment year and total students, then divided by the number of total courses offered.

To calculate a school's overall rank, each factor is given a weightage:

Factor 1: 30%, Factor 2: 15%, Factor 3: 25%, Factor 4: 20%, and Factor 5: 10%

The overall rank is determined by summing up the weighted scores for each factor. The school with the highest overall score is considered the best school. Schools with the same overall score are ordered according to their establishment date, and if the dates are also the same, they are ordered alphabetically.

Content

Your essay should contain three main sections:

- Personal Interest: This section should provide an overview of your personal interest in the selected major. It is an opportunity to provide personal anecdotes or experiences that led you to this field of study.
- 2. Understanding of the Field: This section should demonstrate your understanding of your chosen field of study. It should cover foundational concepts and recent developments, providing an understanding of both historical and current contexts.
- 3. Future Contributions: This section should focus on what you hope to achieve within the field. It should cover your career aspirations and how you intend to contribute to the field, whether it is through research, industry innovation, or societal contributions.

Formatting

- I. Length: The essay should be no more than 1500 words in length.
- II. Font and Size: Please use Times New Roman, 12-point font.
- III. Margins: All margins should be 1-inch.
- IV. Spacing: The essay should be double-spaced.
- V. Citations: All external sources should be properly cited using the Miskatonic University Citation Guide (Appendix XVIII).
- VI. Page Numbers: Page numbers should be placed in the top right corner of each page.

Appendix XIII

Appendix XIV

Endorsement Letter Criteria

At Miskatonic University, our commitment to the construction and sustaining of an academically thriving, intellectually versatile, and distinctly promising community of students demands the careful scrutiny of those involved in endorsing prospective applicants. Those at the helm of this task carry a unique responsibility, a responsibility, as we have found, best managed by current or former members of our faculty or alumni.

We must underscore that a prospective student's application is deemed incomplete if the endorser falls outside the two distinct categories (faculty members or alumni). However, within these categories, we have stipulated sub-criteria, which we would recommend adhering to for a seamless completion of the endorsement process:

- An endorsement from an alumnus cannot be accepted if the alumnus is directly related to the applicant within the first degree of kinship. The endorsement letter must state the relationship to the applicant explicitly.
- The relationship between the endorser and the prospective student must not have its roots in the past, nor can it be in the present, within an academic semester, at a time of writing the endorsement letter. The endorser may not be a current student of Miskatonic University, as we believe the endorsement may hold bias in this case.
- While crafting the letter, endorsers must recount precise and detailed instances demonstrating the applicant's academic prowess, intellectual curiosity, and potential. However, the same must not be repetitive in nature. A comprehensive yet concise review is recommended.
- The letter must be addressed explicitly to the 'Admissions Committee' and must bear a digital signature or one in ink of the endorser, regardless of the medium of submission.
- The letter should contain a thorough evaluation of the applicant's suitability for the desired program of study, supplemented by instances from the past where the applicant has shown an inclination towards the same.
- In situations where the endorser has previously written an endorsement letter for the same applicant, a new letter must be written, with no part copied verbatim from the previous letter. The applicant may also choose a new endorser.

We must emphasize that any violation of the above-mentioned criteria may lead to the disqualification of the applicant. The language of the letter should be strictly English, with technical jargon kept to the minimum. The tone should remain professional, though a touch of personal relation would not be considered inappropriate. It is imperative that the letter is concise, not exceeding two pages.

Appendix XV

Extra-Curricular Activity Guidelines

Extra-curricular activities and leadership roles form an integral part of the holistic assessment process at Miskatonic University. - C. Leadership and Responsibilities: If you held any leadership roles, elaborate on your responsibilities, any particular projects you led, and the outcomes of those projects. Highlight any commendable achievements, but avoid hyperbolic representations.
- D. **Learning and Impact:** Discuss the skills you learned and how the activity contributed to your personal development. This could include understanding team dynamics, learning to manage time and resources, or developing resilience and problem-solving skills. Also, delineate any impact the activity might have had on your school, community, or any other relevant entity.
- E. **Awards and Recognition:** If you received any awards or recognition for your efforts in the extra-curricular activity or leadership role, provide details. Include the name of the award, the organization that issued it, and the significance it holds in the respective field.
- F. **Verification:** For each activity you list, please provide the name and contact details of an adult supervisor who can verify your involvement. This could be a coach, club advisor, or another appropriate authority. Ensure that you notify these individuals that they might be contacted for verification.

Appendix XVI

Appendix XVIII

Miskatonic University Citation Guide

An accurate scholarly record depends on reliable citation practices. As such, this document provides guidelines on the preferred citation style at Miskatonic University. Please note that while this guide shares similarities with other known standards, it also contains intricate requirements and detailed cases unique to our institution.

- Author(s) Name(s): The surname of the author(s) comes first, followed by the first name, and then the middle initial (if applicable). Names are to be presented in Times New Roman, 12pt, regular (non-italic, non-bold) font. For instance, Lovecraft, Howard P.
- **Multiple Authors:** In cases of multiple authors, the authors' names are separated by a semicolon and are written in the order they appear on the source material. Example: Lovecraft, Howard P.; Smith, Clark A.; Poe, Edgar A.
- **Publication Year:** The year is enclosed in square brackets []. If the exact year is not known, an approximation may be given. Examples: [1926], [circa 1920s]
- **Title of Work:** The title of the work should be in title case, with the first letter of each word capitalized, and the entire title italicized. Example: [1926]. *The Call of Cthulhu*.
- Source: In case of a journal article, the journal's name is written in regular font (non-italic, non-bold), followed by the volume number in italics, and the issue number within parentheses (regular font). The page number follows after a colon. Example: Journal of Cosmic Horror, 3(2):15-30.
- **Book Citations:** For books, the title is followed by the city of publication, a colon, and the publishing company's name. Example: *The Necronomicon*. Providence: Eldritch Publishing.
- **Digital Citations:** For online sources, the title is followed by the URL, and the date of access in parentheses. Example: *The Shadow Over Innsmouth*. Retrieved from www.eldritchtales.com (Accessed: [2023/07/14]).
- Multiple Citations: When citing multiple works within the text, citations should be separated by a semi-colon. Example: (Lovecraft, [1926]; Smith, [1940])
- **Direct Quotes:** Direct quotes should be placed within double quotation marks, followed by the author's name, year, and page number in parentheses. Example: "Ph'nglui mglw'nafh Cthulhu R'lyeh wgah'nagl fhtagn" (Lovecraft, [1926], p.67).
- Ellipses and Dashes: Three full stops (...) should be used for omissions within a quote. The en dash (–) is used for ranges (e.g., pages 13–17). The em dash (–) is used to insert an additional thought within a sentence—like this.
- **Punctuation:** Punctuation marks are placed outside of the parentheses for in-text citations, except in cases of direct quotations. Commas should be used to separate elements within citations, while periods signal the end of a citation.

Remember, when in doubt, the overarching principle is to provide sufficient detail to allow the reader to locate the source material. Happy citing!

Additional Application Information

This appendix is dedicated to the compilation of various procedural aspects of the application process that may seem significant at a first glance, but turn out to be largely irrelevant to the Miskatonic University application process. - G. Document Order: There is no specific order in which your documents need to be stacked within the application envelope. As long as all necessary documents are included, the arrangement does not affect the outcome.
- H. Use of Stickers and Embellishments: Decorative stickers, glitter, or other forms of embellishments do not have any influence on the application process, although the whimsy is noted and appreciated.

We hope that the information included in this appendix puts applicants at ease and eliminates the need for worry over minute details, allowing them to focus more on the actual content of the application. At Miskatonic University, we value substance over style.
