In addition to our winter symposia we have three ad hoc events coming up within the next three months. In the beginning of November, the symposium "<u>Response-ability and</u> <u>Creativity at the Time of the Environmental Crises</u>" will take place at University of Jyväskylä in Jyväskylä in Finland. From 25-27 November, a three-day session will take place at the University of Iceland in Reykjavik under the title "<u>Racialization</u>, <u>Whiteness and</u> <u>Politics of Othering in Contemporary Europe</u>". Subsequently, the symposium "<u>Bio-communism – Reconceptualizing Communism in the Age of Biopolitics</u>" will take place at the end of January 2020 in Warsaw. News from the board

At the end of September, there were a couple of meetings attended by board and coordinators. On Friday 20th of September, Disa Kamula (chair) and Nicole des Bouvrie (treasurer & vice-chair) attended part of the conference on human rights and education co-organised with the European Humanities University in Vilnius. The following two days the coordinators meeting took place. With many new coordinators in attendance, all aspects and changes in the financial and administrative procedures were discussed together with the board and the coordinators. It was a fruitful meeting, with lots of renewed energy as a result, to take on the tasks of organising the Winter Symposia and the content for the Summer Session in 2020.

During this meeting the present chair Disa Kamula handed over the official ceremonial key to NSU to the new chair Inta Balode. A special moment for NSU, with the first ever Baltic chair!

After these meetings, some members of the new NSU board 2020 were able to meet for two days to talk about expectations, methods of collaboration and areas of responsibilities. Did you know that you can find the minutes of all board meetings on the website?

On Monday 23rd of September three NSU representatives were also able to meet with Head of Department Jolanta Bieliauskaite from the European Humanities University to discuss future collaborations with NSU. Another outcome of these meetings is that NSU was able to send in a proposal for an EU Creative Europe grant in collaboration with FSCONS (in Sweden) and the Laboratory of Stage Arts (in Latvia). This is in line with the aims of NSU in 2019 and the coming years: to find more external funders to support the activities, in order to remain the vibrant and independent organisation it has been since 1950.
