Council Meeting: This coming Tuesday, Feb.8, there will be a countil meeting in Tokushima. At this time there will be two points for discussion and a decision: Sale of the Tokyo property and the possibility of a Japanese Diocesan Father coming to Shinhonmachi as Pastor.

Tokyo property: Two offers have been made to us through the efforts of Mr. Inokuma of the Sumitomo Bank, Tokyo. Of the two the one that seems to be the best is for 205,000 per tsubo. If the sale is agreed upon then after the brokerage fee is deducted it would leave the sum of 2,000,000,000 yen. In the event that the sale is agreed upon then we will discuss the manner in which permission will be asked from Rome for the use of the above sum. After a certain amount of yen is deducted from the total and the rest put in deposits an average of thirty to thirty five thousand dollars could be received annually from the interest of the deposit. This would enable the Vice Province to meet its minimum expenses annually. The budget being received from the Eastern American Province would cease enabling the Home Province to give this sum to other mission works. The Diocese and the Jesuits have been offered an opportunity for purchasing our land and buildings however it does not seem that they have a use for it at this time. Our thanks to Fathers Robitaille and Bourgoin and Mr. Fujino for sitting in on the most recent discussion on the offer.

Japanese Diocesan Father for Shinhonmachi: After consulting the Bishop of Takamatsu several times there is now a good possibility that Father Matsunaga will be able to go to Shinhonmachi as Pastor. This is not only the desire of the Oblates but also that of the people of the parish in Kochi. The Bishop is to notify me by the 8th with regard his decision on this.

Ikeda Rectory: The first stage of reconstructing the buildings in Ikeda has begun. The ground was broken and the foundation begun the first week in January. At present the rectory will come to the sum of kkkk 7,700,000. Adjoining the rectory we will try to build a small hall-chapel mission.

Fathers Barrett and Bonang: Both of these Fathers will be returning to the mission shortly. Recently I received a copy of the paper that Father Bonang submitted to Harvard for his degree - this will be distributed to the mission for your perusal. Congratualions to both of them for the hard work they put in on their courses. After their return we will try to make plans for them to visit the missions so that we can benefit from their experiences.

<u>Father Harr's Mother:</u> Father wrote recently that his mother is having further complications - we join in offering our prayers for her and for the rest of the family at this time.

Language Students: Recently Father Fitzpatrick transferred from the Roppongi School to the Naganuma School in Kyoto. Presently he is trying to commute from Itami to Kyoto daily for classes. Hope that the new classes will work out well. Eduardo will be staying at the Roppongi school. Father DeFruyt is with the Fransiscans at Denenchoofu in Tokyo taking private lessens and taking advantage of various apostolic works in the area.

Tokushima Land: There are two families in Tokushima that would like to buy the land that we have near the Xaverian Sisters. This will be taken up also at the coming meeting.

Most of the Reports for the coming Chapter have arrived and there will be more special reports coming. If there are any comments or suggestions that you have for the chaper deliberations you can send them to either Father Mahoney or me. Our present departure date is set for some time around the 20th of March.

This month I plan on visiting Tokyo, Fukuoka and Kochi - there are two meetings coming up in Takamatsu with the Bishop - one is his council meeting the 11th and one the middle of the month. I will let you know when I shall be dropping in.

Shinhonmachi: The possibility of having a Diocesan Father come to Shinhonmachi has been discussed in council and twice since with the Bishop and his council and with the Bishop, Father Ikeda and Father Matsunage. Everything seems to be proceeding well. This coming week Father Matsunaga will go to Kochi to discuss the request, After this we should have something definite to report.

Nakamura: Father Bill Maher will be returning for his vacation in April to the States. While he is absent we will maintain the mission station and the people of the area will be informed that Father will be returning to the Nakamura Mission - so that they will not think we are abandoning the efforts so well made there. The Bishop has been asked about the possibility of his investing funds for land in the Nakamura area - to which he honestly answered that he does not have sufficient funds for this and asks that the Oblates keep this in mind in allocating funds for mission development in the Diocese. After Bill's return he will be able to do some study on the situation and we can then make a decision on this at a later date.

Contracts: The matter discussed at Mefu was mentioned to Bishop Tanaka and he is whoely in favor of this method of acting whitholding making a contract at this time. As a matter of fact, the Bishop mentioned that he saw no particular need, at this time, for going into the question of contracts; that he is more than satisfied with the namer of our operating in the Diocese.

Clarification: Recently Father LaFramboise has been informed that the work of the Night School and the Kindergarten is his prime apostolate. The same type of clarification will be made for Father Novotny and the Christians of both parishes notified of this. Naturally the Bishop has been consulted on this and he is in favor of this step.

Eishop's council: As you know the council of the Bishop of Takamatsu is made up at present of three Provincials and two Japanese Fathers. Recently I asked that with the three provincials an elected missionary attend the sessions (one for each area -Oblate, Burgo, Dominican). The Bishop shid that he would take this into consideration.

Ordination: Brother Hahn will be returning to the States this month to make final preparations for his coming ordination. Fran will be ordained at St. Bartholemew's in Buffalo on the 29th of April by Bishop Fitupatrick of Brownsville, Texas (former pastor of his parish). Congratulations from all on the mission to you -your Father and relatives, Fran.

Fr. Barrett returns to mission: Welcome back, Jack! It was a long time studying - good to he /e you with us again. We know that you are waiting to get to see the men once more and get to work.

Permission to sell Totyo: After a lengthy discussion on the pros and cons of selling the Tokyo land it was agreed to sell to the Takhei Kogyo Co for the final selling price of \$544,000.00 (six hundred and forty-four thousand dollars - American). It was decided that there was no need to decide immediately how the money will be invested. A thorough investigation will be started as to the most sound way of utilizing the funds - then we will consult with the Eastern American Province and permission will be asked for from Rome.

Inventory: A select number of Fathers will be asked to be in charge of the inventory of the goods of Tokyo. The list will be made available to all the houses. preferences will be established. In the case of duplication of requests we will have to made a decision at that time.

FRuture of Tokyo apostolate: This coming week I will discuss this with the community in Tokyo and see what we can come up with.

Budget approval for 1372: Once more the Eastern American Province has been most generous in allocating the sume of thirty-five thousand dollars for our ordinary allotment for 1972. Even though they themselves are under a financial strain in the home province they have been able to secure this amount for our mission use — our thanks to the efforts of the Fathers in the States for their interest in our mission endeavors.

Tokushima land Sale: At this time we have decided not to go ahead with the sale of our land there.


Ikeda Building: After the present rectory is finished in April a combination chapel-hall will be built - plans are being worked on.

Visits to missions: Tentative dates for visit to the missions: 18th to the 26 - Tokyo. 1st to the 4th March-Pukuoka. 6th to 10th - Kochi. If there is any change I vill be sure to let you know.

Fr. Mahoney: Final reports are coming in for the Chapter. John will be making contact with the various areas for his visit to see you concerning any suggestions you may have for the Chapter.

Chapterpreparations: As we enter the season of Lent I ask that you keep the Chapter in your prayers that the Holy spirit will guide us in the spirit of the Founder that the deliberations at the Chapter will be beneficial for the work that we have as missionantes in the world.

Dear Fathers and Brothers,

Summer is slowly coming to a close - and with it starts the resumption of your full mission programs.

Within a few weeks most of the Fathers "abroad" will be returning to Japan. From the letters that have come all seemed to be quite busy; with study, mission talks, and with visits with their families. It will be good to have the group together once more.

With the beginning of the work in the Fall the charges mentioned to you in the spring will become effective. Dan Ward will be going to Aki this week - shortly after Len Robitaille will head for Ikeda. Dick Bonang will go to Tokushima and Jose DeFruyt will stay in Anan until John Mahoneyarrives back the 10th of September - and after John gets back Jose will join Dan in Aki. Fran Hahn is supposed to be back in Japan in September and as soon as he can he will make plans to go to Tokushima - Fran will be helping out in Takamatsu and Tokushima. It has not been decided where Dave Ullrich will be going. Mike Yamazaki will be in Akita with the AishiKai Sisters - the first term of the arrangement will be until April of next year.

I hope that the above mentioned changes will prove effective for the mission work we have taken on. In order to continue to be effective instruments of Christ it is necessary not only to renew our dedication to the work but also it is important for us to continually renew our spiritual lives. Without this review of our own lives our work becomes shallow — to say the least. We can accomplish this most fruitfully at our monthly gatherings, our get togethers during the week. An atmosphere should had whereby we share willingly with each other our apostolic experiences. Such an atmosphere of renewal is most fittingly found in time set aside for spiritual renewal in community — concelebration, periods of the doffice" said together, homilies exchanged. The day, the manner of Zsuch gatherings, the extent of such gatherings, I leave up to the Fathers in each area. I would appreciate hearing from you about the dates of such gatherings so that I can make an effort to attend.
