Tom Maher has arranged a showing and lecture at the Kochi Prison for the morning of February 10th. The Tokushima Catholic Youth Group under the direction of Ed Quiocho are sponsoring four more showings at the Tokushima church on Feb. 10th and 11th. -- A young man who saw the movie in Kochi last November says, "Now I know what love is. #### KAMOJIMA DAY NURSERY FOR MENTALLY HANDICAPPED OPENS:

Mr. Fumio Abe has launched his long dreamt of day nursery for mentally handicapped children in Kamojima. A copy of the "Project Description" are enclosed with this newsletter. In an effort to cooperate with and involve laymen in the apostolate, the Council has agreed to back this project in as much as possible. The Province has budgeted 1,500,000yen for this project for its first year. The project saw its birth January 15th in s small house behind the railroad station in Kamojima. A bigger house on the main street in front of the station will be available in the summer. There is also a room available at all times for Mass for the christian community in the Kamojima area. We wish Abe-san all the best in this project which has grown out of a desire to give witness to the spirit of Christ in society.

By the March deadline there was little news in, though one piece arrived special delivery as Ron was leaving for a two week tour of Montessori schools in Europe. So again a month with no newsletter.

All that to say, I am sorry for the delay, and please take a minute to send in something every month. We can always hope that the new publisher will be more regular!

# -NEW ENCHO IN 'ITAMI YOCHIEN

Ron has been appointed director of our kindergarten in Itami effective April 1st to succeed Eddie Williams. The kindergarten directors in their January meeting recommended that a fulltime director be appointed since Eddie was already more than busy with the parish, and a fulltime director was needed to see to the gradual integration of the Teaching Sisters of the Immaculate Conception. One Sister has joined the staff as a teacher this year. We hope for others in the future.

In the February meeting of the Council it was decided that Ron take this job. The new Provincial-designate being a member of the present Council was of course involved in this decision.

Until Angelo is installed and until Ron tidy's up the bursar's office for the ext bursar, he will be "commuting" back and forth every other week.

# -NEW ADMINISTRATOR AT SEIBO GAKUEN

Xave has accepted to take over the responsibility for the administration of our night school for adults in Kochi - Seibo Gakuen - effective April 1st, after Ron's "temporary" twelve years, for that is how it all started, as a temporary assignment.... "Please look after things for awhile". Xave sends a piece about the Gakuen which you will find on page two.

I don't know how many years ago this school started. Let's say about I5 years ago. At the start of the school, I gave my name as principal. This was only meant to be a mere figure head. It's not necessary here and now to give all the circumstances of that time. In fact I always was only a figure head. Ron ran the school as the only headmaster-with-power. The principal gave a speech in the beginning of the schoolyear and at the "graduation" ceremony; also something at the Christmas party.

Even after I joined the teaching staff and came to live in Kochi, nothing changed in running the Seibo Gakuen.

It was said to be a whole Kochi prefecture enterprise. In fact, in time of need, priests were called in from Aki or Aksoka to teach at Seibo Kochi. Also it was meant to be an indirect apostolate, a place to meet Japanese people, and a service to the society. Seibo Cakuen is officially recognized by the prefecture, but that doesn't help the school a bit. In the beginning, there were many (8 or more) different subjects taught. The teachers were mostly priests and nums.

Seibo Gakuen has known a time of glory: tig enrollment and financially safe. It even expanded to teaching children English.

Now the situation is different. I don't know what happened or who can explain it. For example, for the first time in it's history, here wasn't any Christmas party last year; only about 6 people attended the schoolyear-end party; only English, French and social dancing are taught now; the children's English program is in the hands of Mr. Jansson; the number of students is very low; and financially the Gakuen is practically in the red since the last 5 years.

As a way of information, I give you the numbers as I found them in the report book of the Gakuen.

in 1975 - 2.578.000 yen

1976 - I.417.000

1977 - 929.000

1978 - . . 348.000

1979 - 901.000

1980 - 1.061.000 (probably thanks to a donation of Fth. Croft o.m.i.)

To find English teachers has been a problem. It seems like that the priests in the prefecture here aren't too interested. Ron could get a few interested for one night a week. I can see that it has more meaning for 'Bill to stay in Nakamura and teach there than to come all the way to Seibo.

Last year in April, I withdrew my name from Seibo Gakuen as principal. Somehow this never made news in the C.M.I. Newsletter.

When I was asked this year to become principal recover responsibility, I wasn't too enthousiastic. After a week of thinking,

I accepted it on the condition that the finances weren't in the red.

I consider the Gakuen not so much as a prefectural enterprise but a city, enterprise. (It would be better if it wasn't in the Japan church calendar.)

If the Gakuen is still a service, a place to contact and guide people, it has a reason to exist.

I don't intend to keep a school on the following conditions:

- I. if she isn't financially producing
- 2. if there aren't good teachers available
- 3. if the priests themselves in this city aren't interested
- ^ 4. if there aren't any new students enrolling.

Condition one: that, we will know by the end of the year.

Condition two : all teachers are foreigners, but not one is ame-

rican or english.

Condition three: fortunately Wency accepted to take the 4 hours of the new class.

Condition four : only two french new students, but I6 new English students.

So we started. And Ron put even two tape recorders in the lab.

#### -DEELY TO TEACH SHUWA:

Literally translated "shuwa" means "hand talking". It is commonly known as sign language. Jack Deely has become very proficient at it. He will be teaching it this year at Yotsuya Commercial High School (Yotsuya Shoogyoo Kootoo Gakkoo). Jack has not given up trying to get sign language introduced into the curriculum at Sophia University.

### -REMINDER: CONSULTATION FOR CONSULTORS:

#### -ANNUAL RETREAT:

# -SPRINGTIME IN PARIS: by Ron LaFramboise

I had the privilege of joining a tour of Montessori schools in Europe from March 20 to April 3. The tour was organized by Len Inui and Prof. Fujiwara of the Kyuushuu Montessori Training Center. In two weeks we covered five countries, eight cities and five schools. Despite the constant rain we had a delightful trip combining sightseeing and "business". The train trip from Florence to Geneva through the Alps was breath-taking -new scenes of majestic snowcapped mountains rolled by the windows for hours.

The highlight of the trip was the visit to the International Montessori Training Center in Perugia, Italy. A Montessori kindergarten and primary school are part of the center which trains teachers from all over the world. Miss Paulini, the directress, one of the last living persons to have worked with Dr. Montessori, was more than gracious in receiving us. She even had japanese tea ready when we arrived! We were impressed by the calm reaction of the children as our group of twenty moved around their work tables snapping pictures from all angles. They were too busy and interested in their work to be bothered about us. The visit finished with 3 fourth graders challenging us to beat them in algebraic equations. The kids were much faster in mental calculation than we with our electronic calculators. The kids discovered the algebraic equations themselves!

# Jesus was no liturgist

Let me begin by explaining where this article is coming from. Three or four factors seem to be interacting with one another in my head as I sit down at the typewriter this afternoon. The first, and maybe least important, was a passing dialogue between my pastor and myself last week. He brought this complex, canonical question to me and a little more than half in jest I answered, "Jesus doesn't care. It doesn't make any difference to Jesus which way we do it." The second reason was the national meeting I attended in Kansas City last month, which I wrote about in my last column, where one of the conclusions was

that the concerns of the liturgical renewal in America today will not be met with position papers, workshops, charts, programs, and conventions. "This kind cannot be cast out except by prayer" (Mark 9:29). The third thing running around in my head is an article by Fr. Nathan Mitchell, O.S.B., "Ethics and Earthiness: The Spirituality of Christian Worship." The fourth is the adoration of Christ in the Eucharist reserved in tabernacles, at exposition and benediction.

Jesus was not a liturgist. Many, especially evangelical Protestants, would go further and say that Jesus was an "anti-ritualist." It is obviously absurd to think of Jesus as the founder of a liturgical spirituality. He didn't hold Bible Vigils. He didn't wander around Palestine talking about the correct use of lectionaries, the making of banners, getting congregations to sing together, or answering questions about the mechanics of giving Communion from the cup. Can y i picture Jesus responding to a question posed by a disciple about the appropriateness or inappropriateness of singing "I Honestly Love You" (by Olivia Newton-John) at weddings?

Jesus did wander around Palestine. But what he did was gather all kinds of people, often all the wrong kinds of people, around tables in restaurants and private homes and banqueting halls as a kind of "living parable" about what the Kingdom is all about. Jesus did strive to get people to love one another. And not abstractly but concretely, by sitting them across the table from one another so they would have to look into one another's eyes: rich and poor, sinner and saint, male and female, law-keeper and law-breaker, Zealot and tax-gatherer. Jesus did provide an atmosphere of hospitality (even when he was the guest and not the host) that brought people together, ultimately into one Body, one community, the Church.

I'll go one step further. It was unimportant to Jesus that he get himself into bread and wine. More theologically accurate perhaps, it was unimportant to Jesus to change bread and wine into his Body and Blood. That was little more than a means to an end: getting men and women into his one Body.

We speak of "liturgical services" and we must take the word "service" very seriously. And the service is not to God as though He needs our worship. God doesn't need worship, people do. God is served only through serving people. Diocesan Human Relations Services and the Diocesan Liturgical Commission are intimately connected in the mind and will of the Father.

Liturgists cannot become concerned about rules and procedures. They cannot become new rubricists, however easy that is to do. They must be about the task of providing the atmosphere where people can come together, to see each other and hear from each other, and come to care for each other enough to reach out and touch one another in the name of Jesus.

This means concentrating a good deal of attention on problems and situations beyond the boundaries of the 45 minutes it takes to celebrate the Sunday Mass. What happens before that 45 minutes during the week, what happens immediately before that 45 minutes in the place of assembly, what happens immediately after that 45 minutes in the place of assembly, and what happens after that 45 minutes during the week integrally affect what will or will not happen during the Eucharistic prayer or during the breaking of the Word or of the Bread or during Communion.

It's been a season for a lot of grests with the Spring vacation and Golden Week. Dick Bonang was down and Fr. Cirilo and three fellows from Emmaus. Just this Monday, Jose and Gerry Stevens came. I had a great time with all of them although I'm still very sorry for taking the last two to Ton Taro's for supper!

I'm keeping in shape with my 9th season in the Early Morning Softball league and with the latest fad, canoeing on the Shimanto River. I play softball for the Pinochio Bakery and we have a fantastic record of 7wins and 2 loses. I'm thinking of putting the winners' flag on top of the Church next to the cross!

It seems ages since I've made a contribution to our news-sheet. A lot of things have happened. Worthy of note was Easter when we were blessed by (6) Baptisms. All of the ceremonies of Holy Week went well. Fr. Paul Placek, C.P. was in the area and came to assist which was a big help. Our Easter celebration was simply great though. Close to 400 jammed into the Church - standing room only- and we all sang and prayed our hearts out for close to an hour and a half. As you will recall, it poured like all the faucets in the sky had been opened, but this didn't dampen our joy a bit. There was a pot-luck dinner provided by each household, and the fun continued right through the noon hour.

Our Charismatic Renewal prayer group continues here. Fr. Matthew, C.P. has joined us, and has helped a great deal in deepening our prayer level. On the average 10 attend this 2-hours of prayer each Monday morning. Recently in Kumamoto city, they were able to realize 200 enrolled in their 3 groups, and this makes it even more urgent that we look for an increase here. Shortly after Pentecost, I intend on starting another Seminar for this.

Some of you remember Kaneko, Kimi san of this parish. She has been a very central figure in our prayer group over the years. She fell, unfortunately, lately and broke her hip bone, and it doesn't appear that they'll be able to operate. How proud I am of her though. Despite her suffering, she's always full of joy when I go to visit her. She is an outstanding woman for sure.

So much of the activity around here at the moment is for our annual bazaar which will take place on the 25th. Last year we cleared 800,000 yen, so this time maybe more. The bulk of the proceeds is to be put aside for a new rectory in the future when that is needed. It's never too early to start preparing.

For 14 years, I had been involved in one capacity or another at the English Academy of Daimyoomachi, downtown Fukuoka. It's had a good record all along. However, here the last year or so, we haven't had enough teachers, and it was taking me away from my work here. So, after talking it over with the missionaries involved, we decided to close this down. Maybe, someday when there are a few willing teachers around, we can get this worthy work going again.

This is a long article, isn't it? One last item- have you heard that the Oblates in McCook, Nebraska are turning back the parish there to the diocese in June? Yep, after 85 years there won't be any more link with the OMI's. It will certainly be a different situation when I return next time.

"...in any Society certain rules of life are necessary, in order to impart unity of thought and action to all the members of the same body. It is this unity which gives strength to religious bodies, fervour to their piety and which ensures their stability."

(Preface)

Once the Constitutions and Rules have been approved, sometime next year, we will have a Provincial Congress so that we can prepare for its implimentation here on the Japanese scene. The dates will be set so that we can ensure the greatest number in attendance. I've asked Fr. Yamazaki to beChairman of the preparation committee.

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

Welcome to Ron La Framboise. Ron returned from the General Chapter on December 10. I've asked Ron to give some talks in the Districts on the General Chapter. Please let Ron know whun you are having your community gatherings.

The following contribution was written by Ron concerning the Chapter.

It was a few minutes before noon Saturday Dec. 6th. There was a special atmosphere in the Chapter Hall as the 111 delegates filed down to the secretary's table in front of the podium to sign the official record. Then Fr. Jette said, "I have one last question to put to the assembly. All the business for which this Chapter was convoked is finished. Do you agree, then, to close this meeting?" There was instant applause. No need for a show of hands or for our electronic voting machine to vote on this motion! After the sustained applause faded away, Fr. Jette added, "I take it that you agree, so I hereby declare the 30th General Chapter closed!" It was 12 noon - 42 days of intense work over - the first major revision of the Constitutions and Rules since 1928 approved with near unanimity. The long process of revision that started in 1959 and in which several thousand Oblates had taken part was now history. A news page in the history of the Congregation had just been turned. The post-Chapter period was started.

Well aware that the text we approved is not "the perfect text" - for not text can be - we are still very confident that it expresses in modern language the spirit of De Mazenod, the values dear to him when he gathered his first associates, and the lived experience of 5,800 Oblates spread over the face of the earth. It reaffirms in stronger language than ever our mission to evangelize the poor - "the poor with their many faces". It stresses the communitarian aspect of that mission. It calls us to a lifestyle in keeping with that mission. It calls us to regular assessment and evaluation of our lives and of our mission.

In approving the revised Constitutions and Rules, we were also aware that we were committing ourselves and each Oblate to take another great leap forward. We committed ourselves to both personal and community renewal - to an on-going vonversion. It was a decision to hear and to heed ever more closely the call the Lord makes to each of us individually and to all of us as a community.

I am grateful to all of you for permitting me to attend the Chapter as your delegate. I am very grateful for this moment of personal grace. A General Chapter is a grace experience, one that is not easily described in words. I look forward to sharing with you as best I can this experience.
