
Dear Brother Oblates,

When the phone rings in the middle of the night, it can either be, that someone failed to check the time-zone of the party they are calling OR it can be some bad news. Last Dec. 18th, I was awakened around 3AM by a call from the Superior of the Kenyan Delegation Fr. Jim Fiori and I knew that it was some bad news about Samuel HONG. "Fr. Sam has been kidnapped!" I waited a while before calling Maurizio but there was an eerie feeling that the perpetrators might be some religious fanatics and the TV footages of the beheading of hostages crossed my mind. There was the dilemma whether to tell Sam's family or not until the Kenyan Superior urged us to notify the family ASAP since the Korean Embassy and the Korean community in Nairobi have already been notified and it would not be good for the news to reach the family from a third source. Things unfolded fast and Sam has already been freed when the parents were notified, and the mother just shrugged it off and said: "He might had been at a place he wasn't supposed to be and she even apologized for the bother that the incident has caused." "All's well that ends well," and we are happy that Sam is safe after a terrifying ordeal.

Jack DEELY, in his recent email, says: "In response to my Feast Day greeting, a couple of guys apologized for not coming to see me." Jack adds that there is no need to apologize and that, with the constant flow of helpers, nurses and volunteers, it might be best to wait a while maybe until he goes into the hospital/home or hospice. "It is very difficult to work out a visitor's time, with the time a home helper or nurse would be here. They would have to be here whenever the visitor is here (to administer medicine, etc.)" he adds. Jack cannot answer the door, so do not try to make an unannounced visit. Your visit has to be coordinated with the help of the

care manager. Thanks for your understanding. Incidentally, Jack will undergo a very delicate operation to fit permanent feeding tube into his stomach on February 10th. It should be a minor procedure with local anesthesia if everything goes well but can turn into a major one with a little mistake. Jack remains in fine spirits and please continue to pray for him.

The whole religious life is in crisis and we just have to look at the mirror, look at our lifestyle, the values we embrace, etc. We who are missionaries in an affluent societies like Japan and Korea even face more difficult challenges. The letter of the Holy Father is all-embracing and perhaps we also need the stern warning like the Superior General's letter to wake us up from our comfortable lives. The two letters can be very good materials for discussions on the district level.



SEASON OF HOPE: People of my generation and above will remember the Cuban Missile Crisis circa 1961-62. I remember my father glued to a small radio all the time trying to listen to the news (TV was a rarity where we lived). My father would sigh that the crisis might lead to World War III and I never understood what the worry was. But I remember the Bay of Pigs and the stand-off between JF Kennedy and Cuba's Fidel Castro who was backed by Nikita Khrushchev of the former USSR.

The recent news on the normalization of diplomatic relationship between Cuba and the USA is an end of another chapter in history. It is edifying to hear that the peace pact has been brokered by Pope FRANCIS. Isaiah's prophecy is being fulfilled in our midst. This indeed is a priceless Christmas gift to the whole of humanity.
