

Dear Oblate Brothers.

On March 29th. - April 1st. the Oblates of Japan/Korea met at the Passionist Retreat House in Manukata for our Annual Delegation Meeting.

Fr. Christopher O'Leary from the Philippines was

the facilitator for the meeting.

The working document for the meeting was the Report sent to Rome This document was the result of our three year work on the Immense Hope Project.

The Japanese Report stated:

BEING WITH -IN COMMUNION WITH

As Christ was sent by the Father to dwell among us as a sacrament of His unconditional Love for all, and to show the Way, thus we are, a multi-national group of Missionary Oblates of Mary Immaculate, missioned to be present here in Japan.

MISSION: Thus

-we are to be witnessing presence

-we are to have listening heart

-we are to seek especially the marginalized WE WILL DO THIS THROUGH THE FOLLOWING VALUES:

- 1. In Communion with God
- 2. In Communion with Our Brother Oblates
- 3. In Communion with the Church
- 4. In Communion wit society

Two of our members from Korea attended the meeting. So as not to loose their contribution time was allotted for them at the very beginning of the meeting.

They reported on their work with the homeless, the migrant workers and formation.

The first two days dealt with Community in Japan. As a follow through to the proposals of the Immense Hope meeting, this General Meeting took up the proposal on forming two or more new communities.

The following was decided unanimously:

- An Oblate Community and Apostolic Center is to be formed in Koga as a center for our future apostolate in Japan.

- Two Oblates will be assigned to a new parish, to be given to us by the Bishop of Nagoya, for the purpose of serving the large foreign community of that Diocese.

- The Kochi area is to be strengthened as an area for Oblate Apostolate.

As a follow up on No. 4 In communion with Society those in Special Apostolates were given time for their individual report:

John Deely on the Apostolate to the deaf. Lei Simons on the Apostolate at Aonami on the Kindergarten Apostolate Len Inui Bro. Yagi on MAMI

Tom Maher on work with the Filipina and children catechism preparation for first communion

Bradly Rosairo gave an in depth report on the devastation and suffering in Sri Lanka following the tsunami.

Looking at the results of our Spring Meeting I see a lot we can be thankful for. The Immense Hope Project begun three years ago is not a mere document but it is alive in the delegation. It is helping us to respond the needs of the Church, our community and society. And the response has been generous. We can be full of Hope and confident for our future as we continue in our dedication and commitment to evangelizing the poor with their many faces.

Pro Life Trip to the Philippines Jerry NOVOTNY

A Brief Report on my Pro Life Trip to the Philippines: Feb. 15th - Mar. 4th.

Marlon C. Ramirez, program director of Human Life International Asia, met me at the International Airport in Manila and the first two days were spent nursing a cold in beautiful 32 C-degree weather at the University of Santo Tomas run by the Dominican Fathers. I believe the University was built in 1611.

The day before I departed Japan, there occurred the "Valentine Day Bombings." Three bombs exploded throughout the country, including Manila, a short distance from where I stayed later. For the past 14-15 years, a war with terrorists from the Southern part of the country has inflicted society with much suffering and pain. Soldiers with rifles, police and security guards with pistols dot the entire country, especially in the big cities. The people have more or less adapted to this type of protection and are making the best of the present situation: working hard, a helping hand to the poor, and a kindness which is unique to the Philippines.

Dr. Resty Monzon, president of Human Life Asia, Marlon C. Ramirez, director of Human Life International Asia, Edwin Lopez, Marketing Director of EWTN for Asia and myself made up the speaking team that flew from Manila to Zamboanga City, followed by a 4-hour rolling-bumpy drive in a Nissan pickup truck to Ipil Town. Some of the poorest of the poor live in this area, not to mention terrorists, and many soldiers. I was forced to leave my "comfort zone" for the first time in my life as an OMI missionary and live on the poverty level of the people in the area. Ipil Town was burnt to the ground 9 years ago by rebels and hundreds were massacred in cold blood.

The seminar speakers stayed at the Bishop's House - an unexpected surprise. The rooms consisted of wooden beds with thin mattresses. And even thinner pillows. The floors creaked, the sink-toilet-shower water ran sometimes with only little pressure, sometimes it didn't. Fans replaced air conditioners and electric failures were not uncommon. When I commented on the highway being under construction, I was told that the gravel road was not under construction. And the list continues...

One man I developed a deep respect for was

Antonio M. Ledesma, S.J., DD, Bishop of Ipil. Living on the same level of poverty as his people, he is relatively a quite man, but people and animals walk freely through his house. A man of the people.

From the 17th to the 21st, a Leadership Training Seminar was held on Life and Family. The participants were various leaders of Family and Life Ministries who came from different islands which make up the Dioceses of Zamboanga, Basilan, Sulu (Jolo) and Ipil. In all,

about 70 participated.

Sr. Aubrey, D.C. organized this first Leadership Training Seminar. She's a young Sister with much drive, determination and a good sense of humor. The Seminar was a tremendous success, centering on workshops and lively participants. Marlon C. Ramirez's topic was "Understanding Family Dynamics"; Dr. Resty Monzon, joined by his wife Dr. Edna Monzon the next day, spoke on "Understanding Marriage and parenting" and "Pro-Life Be-Attitudes"; Mr. Edwin Lopez's presentation was on "Pro-Life Action"; and I spoke on "The Family at the Crossroads: Trends and Challenges" and "Understanding the Psycho-Spiritual Process of Aging". Then came the rolling-bumpy ride back to Zamboanga City, where we stayed one night at an Orphanage and the next morning flew back to Manila. There we read that rebels had exploded a bomb along the route we had taken a number of hours before. On this trip, I learned more than I gave. Marlon put it well when he stated, "Father, you left your "Comfort Zone" to live and experience the real life-situation of the poor in the Philippines". I wondered, could it be that my "Comfort Zone" is a cause of another's suffering? I did learn that the Philippines, teeming with rich resources and sufficient money, suffers mostly from corruption which in turn causes poverty. Overpopulation is not the

Thirty minutes after the hour and half flight to Manila, Mr. Marlon Ramirez departed on a six hour to give a 2-day Retreat to School Teachers and Personnel; then a six-hour drive back the next morning to fly with the team for a Congress. It was decided that I would go with Marlon up North to Baguio City and present the evening session, but things did not work out as planned. My 65 years of existence caught up with me and I had to rest in Manila while Marlon went alone. During the two-day rest, I was able to visit the Pro Life offices, meet the Pro Life staff and receive info on their busy schedules and speaking engagements which cover most of the 7500 Islands in the Philippines.

We departed on Feb. 24th to attend "The 1st Western Visayan Congress on Life and Family" which was held in Jaro, Iloilo City, a one hour flight South of Manila. There we were met by Dr. Rene Josef Bullecer,

another strong HLI-Asian leader.

Angel N. Lagdameo, DD., Archbishop of Jaro, Iloilo and Romulo dela Cruz, DD., Bishop of Antique both attended the Congress. In all, there were over 200 representatives from various dioceses in the area.

Eight talks were given:

1. "Debunking the Overpopulation Myth", by Mr. Salvador Rigor, Jr.

2. "The Global Conspiracy Against Life & Family", by Mr. Marlon Ramirez.

3. "Authentic Womanhood," by Atty. Jane Aguilar.

4. "Overcoming the Culture of Death: Ray of Hope", by Dr. Ligaya Acosta

5. "Family & Life in the Asian Perspective", by Dr.

Orestes P. Monzon

6. "The Family at the Crossroads: Trends and Challenges", by Jerry Novotny, OMI

7. "Medical and Legal Aspects of Ligtas Buntis", by Dr. Rene Josef Bullecer

8. "The Media & the Family", by Mr. Edwin Lopez

Following the Congress, Marlon flew back to Manila to prepare for his next engagement, Edwn flew to Cebu for two days of talks; Resty and I headed for Boracay, a 4-hour bus ride and 15-minute ferry. Those were two beautiful days full of memories. Mar 2nd and 3rd were open days before returning to Japan. During this time I met most of the OMIs working the Manila area and spent a number of hours talking with them - a tremendous group of dedicated and happy Oblates. Jolo and Cotabato were under double red alert, preventing any travel there.

On Mar. 4th with mixed feelings, I left Manila and headed for Kansai Airport where the temperatures were 5 C-degrees, cold North Winds blowing hard and a light snow falling later in the evening. The weather was exactly the same as when I had left three weeks earlier.

I owe much to Resty and his wife, to Lopez and his wife and family, to Marlon, to Rene and to the many wonderful and dedicated leaders in the Philippines. They donated their most precious commodity - themselves and their work - and for this I am most grateful.

12 STEPS SEMINAR

Thanks to the hospitality of the Oblates and the good will of the Sisters in charge of the kindergarten, from March 19 at noon till Sunday afternoon at 3:30 P.M. (March 20), for the 14 time, the 12 Steps Seminar will be held in Kochi.

It is an "open" 12 Steps Seminar so people with other addictions and professional people (health care workers, clergy etc.) are welcome to attend, even if they come for a short time.

After one person shares his or her experience, strength and hope with the whole group, (for 15 minutes) small groups of about 10 gather for a 50 minute meeting at which those who wish (no force, everyone is completely free to share or not to share) share how the step applies to their recovery. During the two days seven meetings like this are held. Saturday evening, a candle light meeting for all who wish to attend is held in the hall. The theme is "Love".

You are welcome to attend even if it is only for a short time. There is no charge. Free coffee and cookies. Once each day a bag is passed around for those who wish to donate to cover the expenses of the seminar.

I therefore open my big mouth again, volunteered, and here I am.

I went to Kochi the first weekend of April for my first "training session". I will be commuting twice a month till at least August, and plan to spend a couple of weeks in August there trying to learn the ropes. I came away from this first session in great awe and admiration for the work that Ray has done over these years. To see the program he has set up for the recording of our finances so that we can make a proper report to the authorities in Japan and in Rome, is really amazing. I know we have a company and, we can hire people to do a lot of this work, but in reality he's done what had to be done, and set it up so that even someone as inadequate as I might be able to carry on. I know I'm not Ray, and will not be able to do everything he has, the way he has, but I also know that I have to learn what he has done before I start trying to change it. The real transition is going to have to take place in me! Maybe I'll have a conversion experience! Say your prayers that it be so. anyway I want to thank Ray from the bottom of my heart for these past 11 or so years.

Whatever may happen it was good to see and be with you all and we missed the few who for various reasons weren't able to join us. May God help us all to prepare for the future we tried to discern in Munakata, as well as the one God is preparing for us in Rome and elsewhere in His world.

But green is the color of Spring.


And green can be cool and friendly - like.

it could make you wonder why, but why wonder why? It's beautiful!


And I think it's what I want to be.

A very good news from the shelter for street youth (Anna's house): So-Tong- Hi, 20 year, who stayed with us for long in the Center, succeeded in his entrance examination to University and has joined in March. A miracle from streets to university brought lots of joy and happiness on the faces of all volunteers who worked hard on this boy. Millions of thanks to the volunteers! There are still 15 more young people in the center.

The center for Homeless people, Hanna's house, is doing very well in this period of economical instability. In fact our guests (homeless people) increased a lot from our normal 350 to 450 every day not just for food but counseling, cloths, medical care... Thanks God both volunteers and contribution also increased cumulatively to support these many people. Among the important visitors to our center were: we had the honor of welcoming the Vice-Mayor of the City Mr. Yang and the Ambassador of Italy Francesco. Both of them gave a good contribution for the center.

The last but not the least to arrive in our center was a beautiful baby girl. A homeless woman
