Dear Brother Oblates,

On October 3rd, we officially became the General Delegation of Japan. It may take a little time to get used to this title. This new title has an advantage in that it invites us to see our lives and mission in a new way. I feel we are in a position of actually refounding the mission. It is no longer a question of renewal. Our mission will be different. Some of the works we cherish most may have to give way to a new way of doing mission.

It seems clearer to me than ever and to many of you that we are now at a point in our history when we are called to determine the future of our Mission. It is a graced moment for us.

The process of refounding the mission already began with "The Immense Hope Project". We took a hard look at our present ministries and celebrated our History. Now the center of our focus will be on our Oblate mission and the needs of the Church we serve. It calls for us to do some planning on the basis of a realistic analysis of our life and mission.

We have done a great deal toward mission planning already. At the OMI Spring Meeting 2003, our decisions were concretized in our "Being with - In Communion With "Statement. In our evening, somewhat "more lively" sessions many important expectations emerged:

- -Reducing number of places run by lone and free individuals
- -Forming small communities out of which men could go out and minister
- -Caring for the old and sick (Explore possibility of establishing a residence)
- -Putting into action the Mission Vision Statement

Discerning on further restructuring of the Unit

Being attentive to the needs of the Mission of Korea

How to pass on the responsibilities of the mission to our younger members

Difficult and painful decisions must be made. The Immense Hope Project will be a great guide for our decisions. Furthermore I believe the men on this mission have the

courage and desire to plan our new future. God chose us to continue His work. He trusts us with His most precious possession the Church. He promises He will be with us.

On June the 28th the Tokushima Prefecture Police Department's Translators Meeting took place. This was the 12th meeting of this group. At this meeting I was installed at the Kaichoo (Director). There were forty translators and twenty three connected with the Police Department in attendance. You name the language and we have a translator for the department.



The group was formed twelve years ago to assist the police department in translation. Even before this time, when I was in Naruto, I was called to translate from english to japanese many times. Then the Prefectural Police Department asked for volunteers to begin this group.

Since the beginning I would spend endless hours at the police station with the detectives as they interrogated suspects in crimes in the area. Some cases went on for days until it was brought to the Procurator's Office. After that it would end up in Court. Actually I only translated in Court cases a few times. Working with the Police Departments is interesting but tiring. After one hour I would have to

ask for a break. Otherwise I would end up speaking japanese to the one arrested and english to the Japanese detective.

The detective's work is grueling and difficult. However the presence of a translator is encouraging for the arrested person. In many ways I feel that I not only help the department but also the arrested individual.

One consoling case was when I translated for two Sudanese and during the investigation they requested "amnesty" for political reasons. Through the help of the local department and the Amnesty Group in Takamatsu they were granted amnesty. When they were released they were taken care of by the Fransiscans in Tokyo. Eventually one of them married a Japanese girl and now is doing well in Tokyo.


At our meetings talks are arranged on various topics pertaining to the crime rate among foreign residents in Japan and on the efforts being made by the police departments to give their personnel opportunities for learning foreign languages. The translators are continually reminded of their responsibilities as translators and our help is appreciated by them.

I feel that is a service that I can provide to help locally with the police departments and also to be available to be of assistance to those who find themselves arrested here in Japan.

OMI Summer Camp

On the 13th we went to a river on the outskirts of Aki City where we were able to commune deeply with Mother Nature. Because of a typhoon a few days before the camp, the river was too dangerous for us to swim in, however. The young people, who rarely have the occasion to commune with nature in such a form, were able to face the gentleness as well as the ruggedness of nature. It was also an occasion for them to face themselves.
