


WAITING FOR . . .

Oyagyo-group work had the 71st and 72nd session in Kochi. In June I was asked to start a group in Takamatsu Seibo Yochien, which will last until March. Luckily I have an assistant like Mrs. Ichikawa Kimiko otherwise I wouldn't be able to do it. At the end of September after eight years the office of the Inochi no Denwa moved out of the Volunteer Bureau to a place provided by the prefecture being fourth on the national suicide list are pressed to take some action.

Last April Kochi Prefecture opened a shelter for battered women but administered by a private group.

Aonami celebrated on the 8th of December its eighteenth birthday. On the fourth of December we had a group visiting Aonami. They came to Kochi on the invitation of JICA (Japan International Cooperation Agency) to study social welfare. Journey for Life into Asia

This year has been a busy one. Since retiring from Kochi National University three years ago, I founded a new organization called "Journey for Life into the Heart of Asia." Its purpose is to find donors who would sponsor travel expenses for speaking engagements to poorer countries in Asia. This year the organization has sponsored trips to Sri Lanka (twice), Indonesia, China (twice) and the Philippines (twice). The project involves traveling to villages and areas which are poor, in many cases, people who have little or no education. The trips average two to three weeks. The lectures center on "The Asian Family at Crossroads: Trends and Challenges." This is a series of talks touching upon the changes taking place within the Asian Family and related Life Issues such as abortion, euthanasia, contraceptives, population and life beginning at fertilization, etc.

The project so far has met with much success. The lectures average 2-3 hours and the audiences from 40 to 200 people. In the Philippines, 800 attended a three-day conference this past October. In Hong Kong I spoke to 200 Philippine Migrant Workers. At present, there are around 450 who are working there.

The main highlight was the last China trip. I was able to speak to young people groups at seven underground Churches, a number of pre- marriage groups, three evenings to 150 minor seminarians, 7 lectures to the 4th year theologians at the largest Major Seminary in China plus a number of talks to a Diocesan Convent of Sisters numbering 79, who were founded after the Cultural Revolution 18 years ago. The traditional Chinese Catholics have a very deep Faith and a strong determination to make China the #1 Catholic country in Asia. Christ is very much the center of their lives. And they love to study the Bible. There is a general feeling among the people and publicly by the government itself that the cultural revolution was a failure and did much harm to the country. Many recall the persecutions that took place between 1966 and 1988.

In addition to oil painting, I have started a new hobby - Mandarin Chinese. Having turned 66 last March and heading for 67, it is definitely a challenge. What enters the mind one day seems to evaporate the next. If the opportunity should arise, I definitely want to say more than "Ni Hao" next time.

My health is holding up very well. I'm still on medication for cancer. It is contained but not cured. However, I have no complaints and accept each day as something very special in my life. Being a Bohemian, there is always that strong desire to survive and reach out into the unknown.

I wish you all a Blessed Christmas and a Happy New Year! Be assured of a special place in my Christmas Mass and thoughts, in a special way I pray for Ange and those Oblates who are suffering in our Japanese mission.
