Summary

This MA is a unique opportunity for students to gain an in-depth knowledge of the theories, debates and practical issues associated with radical right extremism, one of the top security concerns today for governments on a global scale. Combined with a broader exploration of terrorism and security, it will equip students either for further study or a career in specialist roles such as counter-terrorism or positions within a wide range of international relations organisations.
