#### Dear Friends,

This letter comes out in the Church Magazine from Palm Sunday onwards. No Donkey Parade or Palm Waving this year. Well, maybe this is not happening on the pathways of Scone and St Martins but you can enter Palm Sunday in mind and spirit and travel with Jesus through Holy Week to Good Friday and Easter Day. What does the word Hosanna mean? Some imagine as they hear the cries along a dusty road as the crowds welcome Jesus into the City and as they shin the trees to get a view of him, and scatter their cloaks in front of him, that the word Hosanna means three cheers for Jesus!

In our Easter Faith it can mean that: Sing Hosanna to the King of Kings. But let us not forget the origin of the word, it comes from the Hebrew and translates, "Save us", "Deliver us". It was a cry for help that the nation would prosper and not be destroyed (Psalm 118: 25). It was the cry of an oppressed people for freedom. It was a cry for help that was to journey into a song of praise.

Journeying: How many people ought to be journeying on the pilgrim paths this season but the paths to the holy places seem to have gone quiet; there are not the same crowds journeying upon them. I wonder what journeying they are doing. Is there anyone who is not finding these times we are living in, strange? Some may be travelling paths of the mind seeking freedom from sadness or depression. Others may be travelling paths seeking freedom from pain, a cure for a loved one, personal healing and wholeness. Still others may be travelling seeking freedom from anxieties and dreads. All may be longing to emerge from the coldness and darkness of existence into the new light and life of blessing.

The journeying of Holy Week addresses much of that yearning and many were the changes known within and without the City walls.

But when I look to Christ I see in all life's journeying a call to prayer and an example in prayer life, identity with our griefs and sorrows, total self-giving love, knowledge of the agony, experience of darkness and death, witness that these do not have the last word, and in the offering of new life the granting of us to have the confidence to confess through the offering of his unconditional grace: O Death where is thy victory? O Grave where is thy sting? Thanks be to God who gives us the Victory through our Lord Jesus Christ!

What are the paths you pilgrims travel? Travel the paths of true Hope, Faith and Love. Travel the paths of healing and mercy in your prayers. Travel the path of thanksgiving that in every circumstance of life you have a Saviour and Friend who is ever with you. Remember the old hymn? What a friend we have in Jesus, all our sins and griefs to bear; what a privilege to carry everything to God in prayer. O, what peace we often forfeit, O, what needless pain we bear, all because we do not carry, everything to God in prayer. Have we trials and temptations? Is there trouble anywhere? We should never be discouraged, take it to the Lord in prayer. Can we find a friend so faithful, who will all our sorrows share? Jesus knows our every weakness, take it to the Lord in prayer. He is the One who gifted us the prayer: Our Father which art I heaven, hallowed be Thy name. Thy kingdom come, Thy will be done in earth as it is in heaven. Give us this day our daily bread and forgive us our debts as we forgive our debtors. And lead us not into temptation but deliver us from evil, for Thine is the Kingdom, the Power and the Glory for ever. AMEN.

Indeed, at 10.44am, on Easter Morning, you might like to open your window to hopefully hear the Church Bells ringing and when they stop you might like in your own homes or gardens to join me in the Easter Acclamation: Christ is Risen! He is Risen Indeed! Alleluia! Don't whisper it. Shout it three times!

Thereafter I invite you to sing, Jesus Christ is risen today, Alleluia, our triumphant holy day, Alleluia, who did once upon the Cross, Alleluia, suffer to redeem our loss, Alleluia!

In your Prayers give thanks, make confession, and know Christ's acceptance and love. Sing your favourite Easter hymn and hear this lovely reading for Easter Day from John 20: 1 – 18:

Now on the first day of the week Mary Magdalene went to the tomb early, while it was still dark, and saw that the stone had been taken away from the tomb. Then she ran and came to Simon Peter, and to the other disciple, whom Jesus loved, and said to them, "They have taken away the Lord out of the tomb, and we do not know where they have laid Him."

Read on into the verses missing - the reading concludes with:

Jesus said to her, "Mary!" She turned and said to Him, "Rabboni!" Jesus said to her, "Do not cling to Me, for I have not yet ascended to My Father; but go tell my brethren and say to them, 'I am ascending to My Father and your Father, and to My God and your God." Mary Magdalene came and told the disciples that she had seen the Lord, and that He had spoken these things to her."

Join Mary and travel the path that takes you beyond any prolonged wintering of spirit to the new birth of Easter with all the hope and promise Christ holds forth to you in Resurrection Blessing. Open your whole being to the warmth and joy and light and love of the early rays of Easter Dawn! I am going to travel a few paths in body and spirit on Easter morning. The first will be out of bed to prepare to tread the second path, out into the garden. From there I'll travel the path into the Kirk yard and Grave yard and with Mary I'll hear His voice; onwards the 4<sup>th</sup> path will travel to the banks of Burnside where I'll meet with Him in all creation and celebrate the Water of Life. The fifth path will take me to Balformo Road then far beyond, out to St Martins and yet further on to the place he stopped and supped with them and where their eyes were opened and he vanished from their sight. The sixth path will take me all around the parish and as I continue to know his Presence and Blessing in our locality, I'll hear Pilate's wife ask, "Where is he now?" And I'll hear the Centurion reply, "Into All the World" and my prayers will go globally that Christ's Resurrection Power may be known and accepted the world over. The seventh path will lead me to a room at home where I'll encounter Christ of the wounds and I'll hear the words, "Thrust your hands into my side", "Be not faithless but believing", "Blessed are those who have not seen yet believe". He was, and is, and is to come.

Will you travel the Easter paths with me? And in your own homes will you break bread and give thanks for the Risen Christ.

O Sons and Daughters let us sing, the King of Life, the Glorious King, o'er death today rise triumphing: Alleluia! Alleluia! Alleluia!

On this most holy day of days, our hearts and voices, Lord, we raise, in this triumphant hymn of praise: Alleluia! Alleluia!

Meantime, feel God's HUG being extended to you.



#### **Church Finances**

We are facing a period of uncertainty for the Church's finances, with the suspension of services for an indefinite period. Our income from hall lets and from fundraising are likely to be greatly reduced. Offerings paid to our bank account by standing order will not be affected, but we could have a long delay before we can catch up with the collections which our members contribute on Sundays by the weekly freewill offering (wfo) envelopes, and the potential loss of open plate offerings.

For those who use the wfo envelopes, or the open plate, it is of course an option to wait until the current restrictions come to an end, and then resume your offerings. We would encourage you to think about switching to payment by monthly standing order through your bank. In Uganda the blind are diagnosed and marginalised because of their disability. They are poverty stricken and cannot afford the Bible in braille. In the community where they live, they are invisible. People have a negative attitude towards them which means that they are usually excluded from holy sacraments, listening to preaching or even participating in church choirs. This leads to lack of self confidence. # Quild

#### **GUILD**

The 2019-2020 session came to an end abruptly due to the coronavirus emergency. The meetings scheduled for 17 and 24 March had to be cancelled. It is hoped that Jane Sheldon's talk on Linus Quilts can be rescheduled and that the AGM will be held at a later date.

On 10 March Lorna Tunstall was the speaker on one of the Guild's projects "Journeying Together" which is concerned with empowering teenage mothers in Zambia. The work is undertaken in conjunction with the United Church of Zambia. The mothers live in areas where there is no electricity, no running water and poor housing. The girls are anaemic and malnourished. The project helps 50 young mums at a time, providing plastic sheets for birthing and baby clothes. Education on alcohol problems, pregnancy, harmful traditional practices, HIV and AIDS is available. The girls are trained in various trades such as laundry, tailoring, basket weaving and growing and selling produce.

On 13 March four of us attended the Perth and Kinross Guilds Together Lunch and Annual Business Meeting at Letham St Mark's Church. Iain Whyte, National Secretary was the speaker. He gave a potted history of the Guild and highlighted that Guilds had supported projects all over the world.
