Opening of Churches

We have now received approval from the Presbytery for the re-opening of our churches, initially for individual prayer and meditation, and, we hope, in mid-September for limited church services.

The opening will start on Sunday 23 August at Scone Old from 2.00 – 400 pm and at Scone New on Wednesday 26 August at 2.00 - 4.00 pm; these will be on a weekly basis. St Martins will also be open on Wednesday 26 August at 2.00 pm but will be on a fortnightly basis.

There will be all the necessary precautions in place when you arrive at church, and you will be directed by those on duty as to where to sit and how to exit the building. Families can obviously sit together but otherwise you must maintain the two metre rule. You will also be required to give your name and telephone number for test and trace purposes and this information will be held for 21 days and then destroyed.

The Kirk Session looks forward to seeing those of you who feel comfortable in coming to church but if you have any qualms about attending, please follow how you feel and stay at home.

GREETINGS FROM CHRISTIAN AID

Dear fellow members of Scone and St Martins church, I hope that you are keeping well during the present crisis.

I am frequently receiving information from Christian Aid and thought that I would share the latest email I received with you.

GUILD



As you read this we would normally have been looking forward to the Guild Summer Gathering and the Church Fair but as we are all aware cancelled as a result Covid-19. We would also be looking forward to the new session of the Guild but as yet we have no idea when the session might start.

One of the casualties of the virus is the Annual Gathering which was scheduled to take place in the Caird Hall, Dundee on Saturday 5 September. However, a 'Virtual' Gathering has been organised so if you have a smartphone, tablet, computer etc you can join in by going to the Church of Scotland website at 11.00 am on 5 September where it is to be streamed. Hymns, music, contributions from various people are to be included along with communion which you can participate in at home.

The National Council has agreed that, going forward, the incumbent National Convener, currently Marian McIntyre, will chair the Annual Gathering and in the afternoon the new Convener will take over. The new National Convener this year is Mabel Wallace.

This being the beginning of the final year for the current projects and not being able to hold traditional fundraising activities, we'll have to think of other ways of raising funds for our nominated projects – this coming session our branch will be supporting the Sailors' Society and Malawi Fruits.

In the not-too-distant future the National Council will be considering projects to partner with for the next 3-year strategy. If you are aware of any Christian charity that may be interested in applying to be a project partner for 2021-24 ask them to contact the Guild office.

Plans are still in hand to hold a Big Sing at St Georges Tron in Glasgow on Friday 4 December following all guidance in place at the time. Further details will be issued later.

If you have access to email you can sign up on the Church of Scotland website to receive the Guild Enews. The following is taken from the issue on 20 July –

The Lord Himself will lead you and be with you. He will not fail you or abandon you, so do not lose courage or be afraid.

Normally at this time of year we would be thinking about holidays, and perhaps some of us are. Many of us however will have had to cancel a holiday or be uncertain about when we will feel able to go on holiday. "It's been a journey" is a phrase often used when someone has experienced a change in circumstances. The idea of life as a journey is common in many cultures and a phrase we could certainly use at the moment to describe our position. The Bible is full of journeys

led by faithful men and women, chosen by God, from Abraham and Moses to Paul and of course the earthly journey of Jesus Himself.

Life is a journey; faith is a journey. We remember those who have guided and encouraged us on our life journey and have brought us to faith. The Guild has been on a journey for more than 130 years and in the last two years we have considered how we will continue the journey and with whom we have travelled and will travel, each choosing, with God's help, the right path for us. We are now ready to think about going the Extra Mile. We have no shortage of examples of people who have gone the extra mile for family, friends and neighbours in the last few months and we could make a long list of when God has gone the extra mile for us.

We look to the future in the knowledge that wherever we go, whoever we journey with and whatever challenges the journey brings, we do not travel alone for God is always with us, leading us and sometimes carrying us when we are too weak to continue. What a comfort and what strength we gain from knowing that we are always in God's presence.

In Exodus we read how God trusted Moses to lead the people of Israel out of Egypt to the promised land. God was with them day and night, as He is with us.

During the day the Lord went in front of them in a pillar of cloud to show them the way, and during the night He went in front of them in a pillar of fire to give them light, so they could travel night and day.

God guides and cares for us on our journey, showing us the way forward whatever that might be. We trust in Him completely. In the words of the well known hymn:

As I travel through the bad and good, keep me travelling the way I should; Where I see no way to go, you'll be telling me the way I know.

Notes:

- Offerings are down by 14% on last year, due to the absence of church services since late March. Many of our members have helped to sustain our finances by sending us wfo cheques and other donations during lockdown.
- We received a £1000 donation from our Boys' Brigade in June.
- Fundraising was from the March coffee morning (£1074) and the start of contributions for the Minister's sponsored slim.

We continue to be in a difficult period for Church finances. Our deficit for January to June in unrestricted funds was over £13,000. By the end of July, the estimated 2020 deficit may reach about £17,000. Our bank balances remain strong enough to be able to last well beyond July, but the continuing loss into the autumn of income from hall lets, fundraising, and part of our regular offerings will lead to a very big dip in our resources.

Some of the congregation who normally make their offerings in cash through freewill offering envelopes, or the open plate, may wish to consider switching to payment by monthly standing order through your bank. Many thanks to those of you who are already taking such action.

Thank you again to everyone for your continuing support, which has been crucial in keeping our deficit down.
