Acting Session Clerk's Report

By the time you read this, some more changes will have taken place. Social distancing and the two metre rule no longer applies to the churches or the halls. We are not yet allowed to put back in place the transport scheme but individuals may, if they so wish, transport people to church but as an individual, not as part of a church scheme. Changes are taking place on a weekly basis, so some of the above items may have changed by the time you read this.

We have had a proper Kirk Session meeting since the last issue of Church News. By proper, I mean we were all in the same room for the first time in nearly 18 months. The halls are also due to reopen in September, but several groups have decided to wait a bit longer before committing to restart, and given the current rise in cases, this is quite understandable.

As many of you may already know, Janet Cathro has decided to retire as cleaner of the Burnside halls and as the organiser of the teas/coffees at Burnside after the morning service. I think she started the teas in 1985, so it is fair to say that she is due a long and happy retirement and that she will now get her cup of tea made for her. Just for a wee change!

We have decided to restart the teas/coffees after morning service, but there will be some changes from what was done previously. Masks will have to be worn until you are seated. Biscuits will be supplied but handed over with tongs by those on duty.

Hopefully, we are moving nearer to what might be considered normal, but we must still keep an eye on what is happening in the wider world. It will be great to be back to normal services and the ability to stop and have a chat. The Kirk Session is looking at the possibility of reopening the Hub and the fortnightly lunches, but this will depend on what happens over the next month and if we are able to get sufficient volunteers to assist. GUILD

The Kirk Session having agreed to the opening of the halls, I am delighted to say that the Committee has met and mapped out a possible syllabus for the coming session, the first in the new strategy Look Forward in Faith. The theme for the year is **Lights and Bushels**.

Due to the decision to open the halls being only recently being made, the session will start on Tuesday 12 October at 2.30 pm in the Balformo Road Hall. This month I would like to share part of a letter which I received from Christian Aid. It is intended for all of you who so generously support the work of Christian Aid.

'Thank you for the loving support you have given through Christian Aid to global neighbours who are battling poverty around the world. Like you, I believe in being there for my neighbours, from all faiths and none. That's why I work with Christian Aid in Burundi.

I really believe that love connects us all – and that every time we reach out to others, we make the circle of love even bigger and stronger. So today I am delighted to be able to reach out to you, with loving wishes and uplifting stories from my neighbourhood and beyond, in our global community. We are all in this together, but, if it were not for people like you, many of us would not be here today – strong in the knowledge that you and others are standing in solidarity with us.

Consolate, who lives in Southern Burundi, is a mum whose children were at risk of malnutrition. Poverty severely limited her family's diet: 'My spouse and I had no knowledge of nutrition and we didn't have enough food for our children.' Through a Christian Aid project, Consolate gained the knowledge and skills she needed to turn these problems around. 'I learned how to feed my children a nutritious diet using local foods. I learned how to grow vegetables and now have my own vegetable garden.'

El Salvador

"Direct your children onto the right path, and when they are older, they will not leave it". Proverbs 22:6 Teenagers in many urban areas live in places where gang culture is rife. Many of them come from fragmented homes where their parents have left the country for work and they live instead with grandparents or an uncle. Often these young people have a hard time choosing their path in life, but schools provide a safe place for them. The Bible Society in El Salvador is working with schools to teach Biblical values. They aim to encourage pupils to trust what God says in his Word, become less fearful and make the right life choices.

Please pray: that the teenagers participating in the project will find God's purpose for their lives. Pray that God will protect them, too, from the negative influences of gang culture.

Prayer Notes

Be still, for the power of the Lord Is moving in this place:He comes to cleanse and heal, To minister his grace -No work too hard for him. In faith receive from him.Be still, for the power of the Lord Is moving in this place.

Suffering for Christ was normal for the early Christians, its scars were seen as badges of honour settled by the Lord. Suffering is normal for many Christians around the world today, through many tribulations we must enter the kingdom of God.

Even when persecution does not occur the disciples of Christ are always misfits in mainstream society and at the very least suffer in this way. Jesus warned us that the world will hate us because we do not brone to it. Writing to believers in a context where suffering is the norm, Paul tells us to be "patient". This is a very positive and active kind of patience and a passive endurance. It has been described as a "brave patience" which perseveres in bearing the load whatever it is which refuses to complain, weaken or be discourage and refuses also to try to slip out from under the load.

And now the words of an Indian Christian martyred in Assam:

I have decided to follow Jesus I have decided to follow Jesus I have decided to follow Jesus No turning back, no turning back!

Notes:

- Offerings are up by nearly 5% on last year, due mainly to the timing of some large gift aid receipts. The return of services is not yet being reflected in regular offerings, and this is demonstrated by the comparison with the 'pre-covid' 2019 total, against which we are down by 15%.
- Tax recovered is down compared with 2020. There are two claims submitted (nearly £3000) which will show some catching up by September.
- Donations last year included £1000 from The Boys Brigade.
- A £300 contribution has been received from The Guild.
- Fundraising so far is from further Recipe Book sales and the Sponsored Walk, with more to come in August. Last year's figure included a coffee morning and part of the Minister's sponsored slim. Hopefully some further fundraising later this year!
- It is hoped that the resumption of hall lets will also provide a boost to the last quarter of the year.
- Our salaries expense (not shown above) has been reduced by Job Retention Scheme grants of £4160.
