I put it down to the variety of challenges that have come our way in 2021, and doubt that many have wearied in well doing. It has been truly splendid how all the generations have combined their gifts to give encouragement one to the other, from the smiles of our little babies and children through to the wisdom of our senior members. In that regard, I am printing the report on the life of the Church that has gone to OSCR and to the Church of Scotland reflecting some of the on goings in Church life and in the life of our organisations. More recently, we have been happy to welcome new members by profession of faith: Elaine Morgan, Penelope and Thomas Sangster, and Richard Martin, and also to welcome baptisms. The weather was perfect and set the tone for the day, our Congratulations.

We continue to offer Communicants Classes for those intending to join the Church at Christmas. Now, the variety on offer Sunday by Sunday until Christmas is quite amazing. This magazine is published on the October Communion Sunday in Scone Old Sanctuary. In the month of November this year, we are in Scone New Sanctuary and on the first Sunday, 7 November, we look forward to the baptism of baby Olivia Rebecca Sangster, daughter of Penelope and Thomas. Olivia's relatives and friends will be joining us for the baptism and her grand-fathers have served as Elders, though not in Scone. Then, 14 November is Remembrance Sunday. Some will lead prayer, others will enjoy looking around them and offering silent prayer.

From the "Eco- Chaplain": An edited version: "COP is a globally momentous event on our doorstep and a prime subject for prayer. Scotland has the

privilege of welcoming an unprecedented number and a diversity of visitors to what will certainly be a less than perfect gathering, and out of balance between rich and poor. It is time for the Church, visible in the communities in which we live and work, to be beacons of hope, joy, forgiveness, and Good News to every creature (Mark 16:15). Let us use this God-given opportunity to be leaders and workers towards a healthier world."

I wonder what this Christmas will hold for everyone. Hopefully you will not be locked down and be able to celebrate the Season with families and friends, and to bring in the New Year of 2022. Christmas is the second most important festival of the Christian Year and I hope you will be able to join us. Christmas is such a special time of blessing. Love came down at Christmas, a love that is constant in good times and bad if we are open to receive the Love and the Spirit of Christ and let it enter us. But you tell me, many are fearful of not having the supply of food, drink, and gifts, due to Brexit and to Covid, and to the fuel supply, and to the lack of lorry drivers, and to the financial situation. How shall we love? We shall love and deeply love. Look into the eyes of the children and adults who value a smile and a cuddle. Look at all we have accumulated, is there someone who might like a little gift from our home, or something home-made. It might be something we've baked, sewn, painted, knitted or planted. Christmas is not about lavish spending, it is about a whole lot more.

Now, I know, many are generous in their charitable giving and God bless you for it. There are so many good causes to which we can gift from our resources. It is offered us in heart, mind and spirit that we may share these blessings with others. These words come from our hymn book and were written by John Bell and Graham Maule: Before the world began, one Word was there; grounded in God he was, rooted in care; by him all things were made, in him was love displayed, through him God spoke and said: I am for you.

Life found in him its source, death found its end; light found in him its course, darkness its friend; for neither death nor doubt nor darkness can put out the

glow of God, the shout: I am for you. The Word was in the world which from him came; unrecognised he was, unknown by name; one with all humankind, with the unloved aligned, convincing sound and mind: I am for you. All who received the Word, by God were blessed, sisters and brothers they of earth's fond guest. So did the Word of grace, proclaim in time and space, and with a human face: I am for you.

Wishing you the True Blessings of Christmas and a Happy New Year when it dawns.

A Reflection of the Annual Report: 2020 – 21 (This was submitted to the Office of the Scottish Charity Regulator)

Amid the challenges of Covid, the congregation of Scone and St Martins has not been inactive. The use of two sanctuaries each Sunday with an early morning service in St Martins and the offering of two times of worship in Scone facilitated us having numbers above the average as sanctuaries were able to open again. 104 attendees were recorded on Easter Sunday. During Lockdown we made the most of the skills we had. Some tuned in to Worship on the Quay, Songs of Praise, Facebook and into our own Worship on the Web, and we have had visitors online from outwith our Perthshire Parish of Scone and St Martins. Some of our elderly who like to read have had the printed script of our prayers, hymns, and thought for the day delivered to them. When preparing worship for the web, we have been glad of You Tube, and contribution from congregational members and the Boys' Brigade to the offering of prayers, readings (sometimes in the Scots and Doric), and to children's talks. Dependent on the time of year, presentation has varied. "Try Praying" is offered by the Prayer Group which also receives prayer requests. The Bible Study Group, the Boys' Brigade, the Emergency Pandemic Team, and others, met through Zoom. The Kirk Session circulated business and sought opinion and agreement for decision by email and hand delivery.

Communication has been very good in these challenging circumstances. Church News, the congregational magazine, containing newsy update and good pastoral and financial update, has been published and delivered to all on the Roll, albeit on a bi-monthly schedule. The website is much used, including when we are unable to gather for worship in the churches - Worship, Church Magazine, Christian Aid and other initiatives, Prayer, and a Main Page of fresh news, encouragement, and suggestions for keeping upbeat and active, are offered weekly. Facebook is used to keep the congregation and followers informed, with daily postings of prayers, anecdotes and memories. The Church of Scotland website and Facebook pages also allow folk to feel part of the wider church. A leaflet/card of

welcome has been produced with intended distribution to the new housing. When churches are open for public worship, the Perthshire Advertiser is used to publicise the times of services and to remind worshippers that Government and Church of Scotland guidelines are followed. This also gives reminder that though the buildings are closed the Church is active.

Pastoral Care: Committee members have telephone contact with folk on the pastoral and harvest care lists. Neighbourly support in the village is strong. When appropriate and practical, soup and baking is shared and shopping assisted. Flower deliveries recognise illness, bereavement, celebrations of births, big 'O' birthdays and special anniversaries. Good use is made of floral notecards to members resident in the two residential homes and two sheltered housing complexes in the parish. At Harvest, over 100 cards were hand-delivered. Effort is made to brighten dark winter days by delivery of messages, flowers, pots of spring bulbs to over 60 single people, particularly isolated by the pandemic. The pastoral committee's support is ongoing. Elders maintain contact with their districts by telephone and other appropriate means. The Minister operates a daily pastoral phone line to all on the congregational roll, making live contact with members across the parish area. In addition to funerals, pre and post bereavement care is given; visits are made as necessary and within guidelines. Pastoral care also is afforded online, and as necessary and appropriate, through appointment made to safe space in the manse garden or vestry. With three schools in the parish, telephone contact is maintained.

Education: though Education Committee work is curtailed at present, live effort continues to appoint a Youth Leader. Contact is maintained with Church and Community volunteers who run The Hub. Prior to lockdown it was good to have worship led by the Boys' Brigade and on Thinking Day to have Guides, Brownies, Rainbows, Scouts, and Cubs re-associating themselves with the Church and participating in the leading of worship. The early Christmas Eve Service for children was led by the Boys' Brigade and appreciatively received. Sunday school staff continues to maintain pastoral contact with their children. Effort is made to maintain links with hall users.

The Guild reports that though unable to meet in the usual way since March 2020, members keep in touch through telephone calls and notes/cards. A distanced afternoon tea was much appreciated when a small bag containing tea/coffee and sweet treats was delivered to members who consumed the contents at the same time on the same date - together though apart. Despite it being impossible to hold the usual fundraising events in support of projects, considerable sums were sent in March to the projects partnered with Cross Reach and the World Mission Council as part of the One Journey, Many Roads strategy. In session 2020-21 it is hoped alternative fundraising will benefit The Sailors' Society and Malawi Fruits.

Boys Brigade: 2020 started well with over 40 boys in the three sections. Usual programmes were followed with Company Section holding its first ever Burns Supper in January. The first Covid lockdown struck in March and meetings were abandoned for the remainder of the session. The Company Section restarted with outdoor activities at the beginning of September including a clean-up at the community Institute and a tidy up of part of the manse garden. Several outdoor activities were undertaken until the Section (complying with all distancing and sanitisation rules) was able to meet in the church hall from mid-November. 4 meetings were managed before the Christmas break. The Section led a Christmas Eve service in the Church. Unfortunately, the second lockdown hit two days later and the Section has not been able to further meet since then, although it is holding online events. The Junior and Anchor Boys Sections decided not to restart after the summer and to get underway in January but this has not been possible. The officers have, however, been maintaining contact with the boys.

Some General Congregational Activities: The congregation contributed to, published and sold out of its Lockdown Recipe Book; sponsored the minister in weight loss for church funds, and pastoral care, to over £1800; made contribution to website worship, as did the Boys' Brigade, and generously contributed to the Christmas Appeal, mindful of the wider work of the Church and the National deficit/shortfall. Donations were made to Christian Aid, the Foodbank, and the Blythswood and Salvation Army Christmas Appeals. The tourist guide, Trip Advisor, gave a 5 star recommendation. (Among attributes listed was the living memorial to the fallen, poppies knitted by one of our senior members and appended to an evergreen). To achieve well in future years, we continue to recognise the importance of Faith sharing, inviting, nurturing, and welcoming new people to engagement and participation in the life and work of the Church. The needs of the young, elderly, and ages in between are important to us. We are active in meeting the challenges of the moment and in making preparation for the new normal. We continue to appreciate the services of our beadle, organists, secretary, and cleaners. Tribute is paid to the retired Session Clerk for dedicated service over recent years and to the Depute Session Clerk for dedicated service and especially throughout the pandemic, as also to the Treasurer for his attention to all things financial. Appreciation also is extended to the Roll keeper and Magazine Editor, to the Kirk Session for their diligence and support, and to all engaged in Christian Service. We seek and strive to meet the needs of our parish, and our mission and outreach continues. Minister, Office-bearers and Congregational members, from our regularly attending Centenarian to the youngest, have worked and are working to a strong Team effort.

Much work has been undertaken since the report has been written as many of you will be aware. We are here for you in all circumstances and appreciate your prayerful, practical and financial support. Wouldn't it be great if in thanksgiving for having ventured out of Lockdown and met up with friends again we could surpass our achievements of last year!

Company Section

It is great to be back holding face to face meetings rather than Zooming as we did for much of last year. We started back at the beginning of September with 16 boys. From our complement of 16 last year we are 4 down (two have been "lost" without explanation or response to enquiry; one has forsaken us for the football field; and Lewis Flood has gone off to university in Edinburgh. we wish him well in his studies. We have, however, had 4 boys transfer up from the Junior Section. Lewis O' Loughlin is now studying neuroscience at Dundee University but as he is staying at home he is still coming along on a Thursday night. We also wish him well in his studies. He has been given the rank of Staff Sergeant so that he can endeavour to gain his Queen's Badge. He is helping with the programme on a Thursday night. Ryan Mudie is travelling up from Dundee (where he is studying) each Thursday. We currently have 8 boys working towards the Queen's Badge as well as 3 boys working towards the President's Badge. Hopefully there will be a very big presentation event at the end of the session.

The BB have brought out a new award scheme and we are working within that. It has much more modern material than the old scheme (which is about 20 years old) and the boys are tackling it with enthusiasm. There have been big disappointments. BB HQ have decided that the National Competitions will not be held this session which means that we cannot defend our Scottish Chess Championship. Bells sports centre have bumped the Battalion off the Tuesday night bookings in favour of an entity who will be using the centre every Tuesday. Accordingly we are not able to hold our Battalion badminton; 5-a-side football; or our volleyball tournaments. It also looks as if we might also lose out dodge ball event as the usual hall is not available to us this year. It is not possible to get replacement premises for the bumped Bells events but we are trying to find somewhere for the volleyball.

The annual bonfire night is likely to go ahead on 6 November and we are hoping that we will be able to have a coffee morning of some sort at the beginning of December. We will be doing our Xmas card delivery service in December.

We are to be having a chess tournament this session and the boys will be playing for a trophy donated in name of Alex Collie who was a great mentor to the boys in the chess club.

No heart so hard it may not move, no hate resist your open love; defenceless in our hands you come to Herod's power, to Mary's home. As all the wise look for your star, so I must follow where you are; as you are light so I must be, so you are peace, be peace to me.

- Offerings are up by over 11% on last year, with larger attendances in September, combined with generous responses to the National Giving Day Appeal. The current total amount raised through the Appeal is over £3300, and a big Thank You is due to everyone who has contributed.
- Tax recovered has partially caught up with 2020.
- Donations last year included £1000 from The Boys Brigade.
- A £300 contribution has been received from The Guild.
- Fundraising so far is from further Recipe Book sales (£204) and the Sponsored Walk (£1318).
- Hall lets have resumed, and will show up more strongly in the final quarter.
- Our salaries expense (not shown above) has been reduced by Job Retention Scheme grants of £4690.
- The improvement in offerings, and gradual resumption of hall lets, combined with low spending on maintenance, suggests that we should improve on last year's result, which was a deficit of £7946.

In 2020, income streams from hall lets and from fundraising were severely curtailed, due to covid restrictions. Offerings were not so badly affected, thanks to the congegation's generous response to the Christmas Appeal which raised over £4,000). Expenditure on repairs and renewals was kept to a minimum, and this helped to reduce the deficit.

The Financial Statements were approved by the Kirk Session on 17 March, 2021, and signed by the independent Examiner on 24 March, 2021. It is intended to hold a Stated Annual Meeting in 2022.
