I hope this finds you keeping well and enjoying the spring weather. It is a delight to see all things awakening anew. When we arrive for the early morning services at St Martins at 9.30 am on a Sunday morning, it is a joy to see the snowdrops and crocuses and daffodils, all cheering us, at the commencement of a new week. The wooded area by the Church is where the wild flowers thrive. We also delight in the signs, in the close proximity, calling us to respect the red squirrels.

Last Sunday, in St Martins and in Scone we held a service for spring time. St Martins had flowers and plants, tomato seeds, others of various kinds, a potato, and all that signalled our being out in the country among the fields and farms. As we do have the farming community represented there, we included in our earth blessing, a blessing on the farming community. Scone New looked well too. The candles with the Ukrainian flag gave reminder of how not all parts of our world are able to bask in the glory of springtime. The flowers were lovely as ever, and a pot plant and seeds were on the table too. The devastation of Ukraine is such a disgrace, whether we are looking at the actions of Russia or the seeming impotence of other nations to do anything about the situation. We are in some mess as regards nuclear weaponry! It is a tragic situation when the threat of pressing the nuclear button is used to promote the pursuit of evil in the world. And we are in yet another mess as regards all the pledges made and fine words spoken at COP 26. At a local level, I hope we have not forgotten the pleasure we received from cleaner air at the time of Lockdown, and the joy for many of coming off the treadmill of life to take in nature's beauty.

As I write we have a number of special weeks and Sundays before us. Mother's Day is coming up and there are some lovely little surprises prepared for everyone. Thank you to all responsible, leaders and children in Scone, and those in St Martins, who, also, never fail to make beautiful preparation for the services and seasons of the Christian Year, and to extend such a warm welcome.

On the first Sunday in April, there is no early service in St Martins as that it the Sunday we all gather together in Scone. This month our All-together Service is at 10.45 am in Scone Old Parish Church. The first Sunday in April is Passion Sunday. At the conclusion of the service we have the Stated Annual Meeting, followed by a meeting about St Martins which was due to close when the pandemic began but continues on the list of closures. There will be many closures throughout Scotland, and all who are able to attend but who do not attend or support their local church in any way, should consider themselves responsible. Many invitations are given, warm and inclusive, but by some, they are, sadly, ignored. I am inclined to make a separation between Palm Sunday and Passion Sunday, as the children are with us on Palm Sunday. This year in Scone Old we are having the baptism of Elise, granddaughter of Iain and Peggy Lamond. Ellie, who was baptised on the Sunday before Christmas, will present Elise with a flower and posy. And, I am hoping that all our children in Sunday Club, Members of the Boys Brigade, Mothers and Toddlers who meet in our halls, Brownies, Guides, and parents will all feel welcome to join us, in addition to all our regular attenders. Will a donkey be with us? I am truly hoping so! We will have Palm leaves for you to carry, however big or small you are! (and that is not a swipe at those who are not giving chocolate up for Lent; after all these words still hold merit: "A *little of what you fancy does you good*!" In St Martins, we will have a Palm Sunday celebration with the hymns of this special day, and I am sure that in St Martins and Scone the sanctuaries will look lovely.

Now, having expanded on the happenings on Palm Sunday, what is Passion Sunday about? (You will recall that is the day of our All-together Service.) Well, it is not exactly about what the young couple, many years ago, who came to see me about their wedding, thought it was about. I had given them a hymn book, initially, for them to have a look at the Wedding Hymns in it, and thought they might have looked at the index and found the section marked "Marriage". However, it was another word that took their eye, viz., "Passion." A week or so later, they returned and asked for another book as they could find no hymns suitable under the section marked Passion! Well, we have record of Jesus attending a Marriage Feast but the Passion Narrative is different. Whether or not you have read your Bible recently, I recommend you read the Passion Narrative. You will find this in the New Testament, near the beginning of it, in the third Gospel called Luke at Chapter 23, verses 1 - 49. Why not read it through. These verses are about all that humanity did to put Jesus on the Cross. We see him hanging there, and hear his words, as humankind, watching on, reacts in different ways; some sobbed, others railed at him and spat on him, still others cast lots for his clothing.

Though Presbyterians hold that Jesus died once, and for all, we identify with the hymn that says, "In every insult, rift and war, where colour, scorn, or wealth divide, he suffers still, yet loves the more; and lives – though ever crucified." "Christ is alive, and comes to bring, good news to this and every age; 'til earth and all creation rings, with joy, with justice, love and praise." Passion Sunday is so relevant to the times we are living through. In the Ukraine, over 70% of the people are confessing Christians who firmly believe in the triumph of good over evil, and they are giving their lives in that fight. The West has grown comfy in its worship of materialism. It is comfy to sit in our armchairs and wallow in sentimentality. It is relatively comfy even to pack boxes with goods for Ukraine and to send out money. But, is it comfy to take a strong stand for God, and for goodness triumphing over evil? Armchair sentimentality will not win the day!

Now to Easter: Our Easter Services are at 9.30 am in St Martins (with Easter Communion) and at 10.45 am, an Easter Service of Upbeat Praise and Thanksgiving is held in Scone Old Kirk. Come and sing your hearts out. Easter is the High Point of the Christian Year, the most important Christian Festival. However many barbecues you are holding, chocolate bunnies you are eating or dinners in your diary, if you are a confessing Christian, in these times, you will, I'm sure, wish to prioritise 30 mintutes on Easter Day to celebrate New Life in Christ. Bring along your families as we'll have an Easter egg hunt in the garden for the children, and design your Easter bonnet as there will be prizes for these.

Please do not tell me if you opt to eat a barbecued whatever, rather than to prioritise coming to celebrate at a thirty minute Easter Service! I'd find it thrilling if your faith so excited you and motivated you that you brought your barbecues to the Church Yard and invited your friends and families. I doubt that those lying in the graves would object. Personally, it would thrill me to think of someone having a good Easter Celebration on top of my grave, when the time comes for me to be lying in it. Life over death is our motto! I'm sure your steak, burger, chicken or sausage, even marshmallows, will be truly blessed, and that you will be too, with 30 minutes of Easter Worship prior to your tuck-in. Witness on Easter Day! And, that goes for whether you are at home or away.

Now, never fail to realise how much I appreciate you. Indeed, many, members and elders I've ministered to over the years, are etched on my memory. There are so many whose witness has been and is special. We thrill and give thanks for the witness of George Stewart who aged 102 years attends every Sunday, and he most often walks to the Church and back home again. And, there are many more of our senior members whom I will not list for fear I miss anyone out. But let me not omit our younger members, children and babies, and our adherents who are regularly among us.

I recall too, many folk who have passed on, and won't name any in Scone and St Martins, though I could, but allow me to mention two of life's characters among the many I've known. The first was lying in a bed in a hospice. We'd always had a good bantering relationship and many laughs over the years, and he'd determined this would not totally dissipate as it came near his end. On my last visit to him, he pulled out some of his banter and displayed his strength of faith, as he squeezed my hand and said, "Ah! Maudeen, you continue to go to it! And then he beamed, "Fight the Good Fight with all thy might!" It is good advice for us all. The other was a prominent businessman whose interests went far beyond the city in which he lived. He was an Elder, and President of the BB Battalion, and held other involvement too. Many a time, he held lunch parties on a Sunday but none of his friends would enjoy lunch before accompanying him to the Church. They filled up many pews. Then, having been at Church, they would have their sherry and all else, and a beautiful lunch laid on for them. I don't mind if it is sherry, or a G&T, a beer, shandy, wine or something stronger, bring your friends along.

On the Sunday following Easter we have our service of Holy Communion in Scone with the Praise of the Season. There will be no Sacrament that Sunday in St Martins.

The Bell rings forth, every Sunday, in St Martins, and, it is a great welcome. We require a bell ringer in the Old Kirk. Who will ring the bell?! Ron Cathro our much loved Beadle who recently retired not only rang the bell for worship but when he arrived early to check all was in order for worship, he rang the dressing bell, one hour before worship was due to begin. Wow! But that was one of his many talents appreciated by all his ministers. We require a beadle at the Old Kirk with the spunk to follow such example, and with Ron's devotion to keeping the grounds maintained and the flower beds looking lovely. If you cannot do it yourself, recruit a son who enjoys going the extra mile! I'd love a phone-call from them.

Well, this has not been my shortest letter on record but I hope you have found it newsy and stimulating.

## Acting Session Clerk's Report

There will be considerable change happening within the Church of Scotland within the next twelve months.

Firstly, the Presbytery of Perth has agreed to join with four other Presbyteries, namely, Angus, Dundee, Dunkeld and Meigle and Stirling to make a new "super" Presbytery. This will go to the General Assembly in May to be approved and will come into effect in January 2023. No one can be quite sure how the new system will work out but if more power is delegated from the centre to the new Presbyteries and then to local congregations, it could make a significant advance in how all things relevant to the church are done.

Secondly, within the existing Presbytery of Perth, a report was submitted by the Planning and Development Committee, suggesting ways and means of reducing the number of ministers from 26 to 16.5. As you may imagine, some of these proposals are controversial, and as far as we are concerned, the undernoted is the proposal for Scone and St Martins.

NETWORK 6:

- Scone and St Martins, Cargill Burrelton & Collace
- Allocation: 1.0 FTE (reduced from 1.7 FTE) Full Time Equivalent
- Population: 8,200 [8200/FTE]
- Proposal: To allocate 1 FTE ministry (Parish Minister) to this network.
- Collace to be united with Cargill Burrelton (and it's building subsequently closed)
- Cargill Burrelton (& Collace) to become a Presbytery Mission Church
- Scone to become the supervising church of Cargill Burrelton & Collace Mission Church and support ongoing work there.

This proposal will be discussed with the Planning and Development Committee by the Kirk Session within the next few weeks.

JESSICA'S STORY - Jessica Mwedzi smiles with love for her children as she stirs a single bowl of porridge for them but she knows that they are hungry for more. This one bowl of porridge is all she and her family can eat today 'My children crave a decent meal, but I can't provide. We often go to bed on an empty stomach. It pains me to send them to bed hungry'.

For Jessica, drought means every day is a struggle for survival. Like many women in rural Zimbabwe, 7 out of 10 rely on farming for income and food. She toils on her farm but nothing can grow on her ashen, dry land. Drought starves. Intensified by the climate crisis and the effects of war in Ukraine on global food production, it drives families into hunger.

Jessica recalls that 'One year we had no rain. The scorching sun burnt my crops just as they were about to bloom. It was so painful and disheartening.' Her husband is unwell so she is the only breadwinner.

YOU CAN HELP THIS LOVING MUM TURN HUNGER INTO HOPE 'My children give me the power to go ahead ... I pray they have a better future'.

HOW YOUR GIFT COULD HELP - Jessica could grow drought resistant crops, set up water taps on her farm, learn how to grow food if the harsh climate. Her dusty dry land could transform into a garden of hope, abundant with fresh food like tomatoes, cucumbers and beans. She'll be proud of the fruits of her work and she'll see her children enjoy their first full meal in months.

With your gift this Christian Aid week, families like Jessica's won't go to bed hungry tonight. Hope does not disappoint, hope lives in you.

## **El Salvador**

Gangs terrorise El Salvador, making it one of the most dangerous countries in the world. Once someone is involved in a gang, leaving is not easy and former members are often threatened with violence and even death.

The Bible Society of El Salvador reaches out to gang members who find themselves serving time in prison, supporting them and helping them to discover the God of the Bible. There is an opportunity for any prisoner expressing interest to attend Bible School. During their studies, prisoners are often changed as they encounter Jesus and hear about the forgiveness and the new life he offers.

Please pray: that through the Bible many prisoners will encounter Jesus and turn away from gang culture. Pray that they would be able to reintegrate into society.

As well as updating us on what was happening at Guide Dogs for the Blind in general, Val led us through her personal journey to acquiring Jorja and what a valuable companion she'd become.

A goodly number of members turned out to welcome Brian Cunningham, the head gardener at Scone Palace and well-known presenter on Beechgrove Garden, on 25 February. Brian showed a very interesting slide show of some of the many plants, flowers and trees in the grounds of the palace. Also he told us about some of the damage done by Storm Arwen.

Our meeting on 8 March was 'Blether with Beat'. Beat is charity which is involved in eating disorders. Those present were shocked to be told by the speaker, Moira Hookham, that while eating disorders according to popular belief are a female problem, approx 25 percent of those suffering from eating disorders are male.

A sense of relief pervaded the evening of 22 March when, at last, we were able to hold our only fundraising event of the session, the Quiz. Thanks to everyone who donated and served refreshments, donated prizes for the prize draw, participated in the quiz and to Mike Moir for being the question master, the sum of approx £350 was raised.

So they built a very large raft, constructed from huge logs from the tallest trees, lashed together and made secure. It covered quite an area of water. On this platform they built little houses, a tiny church, a store which sold food and clothes and things needed for living. When they moved to a new place of work, the log village was towed with them and anchored by the shore. Life went on as usual. The men went to work in their small boats; the children went to school on the log raft; the mothers did what mothers do. It made such a difference to them all, when they moved their village to accompany their work, they were all together.

Why did they go to such trouble? The reason is this - family life is very precious. Parents had their children with them; children had their parents always there for them. They lived together, ate meals together, played together, had fun together. They marked special occasions like Christmas and Easter, birthdays and holidays, special occasions in summer and winter, with activities on the raft. Ah yes! Families are good! Happy families are the richness of life!

Notes:

- Offerings were up by 9% on last year, thanks to well supported Giving Day and Christmas Appeals, which raised over £7,000. The congregation were again very generous with their regular giving.
- Hall Lets recovered strongly in the last quarter, with many users returning after Covid restrictions were reduced.
- Fundraising came mainly from a sponsored walk, the jam jars initiative and quiz sheets.
- Grants received included £4,891 from the government's Job Retention Scheme.
- Other income included the receipts of the Guild and Clubs, investment dividends and interest on deposits.
- 2021 was a very low-spending year on buildings, but we were hit by very large charges for water, for the first time. Hopefully these charges will cease from April 2022, with the restoration of full charity relief. We benefitted from a one-off reduction in our Ministry and Mission allocation.
- It was very pleasing that we managed to show a small net surplus for the year.
- The bank and deposit balances carried forward at 31<sup>st</sup> December, 2021, totalled £164,215.
- 2022 will be another difficult year, with a budgeted deficit of £7000. We will need the continued strong support of the congregation, and full resumption of fund-raising.
