7 DAYS TO HELP THE POOREST ON OUR WORLD ESCAPE THE INHUMANITY OF POVERTY

So many of our global neighbours are living on the edge of survival right now, we must ensure that as many as possible of us fundraise, act and pray across these seven very important days.

Poverty pushed Aline Nibogora to the brink. She was abused, homeless and hungry. Aline lives in Makamba Province, Burundi, where more than 70% of people live in poverty, 52% of children in this area are underweight, underdeveloped and vulnerable to life threatening diseases. With your support, we can help people like Aline to escape the inhumane trap of poverty and build brighter futures for their families. Aline felt the full force of extreme poverty when an early marriage ended in abuse and homelessness. She experienced great cruelty and pain at the hands of her husband, who forced Aline to flee. He prevented her taking her children with her. What Aline desperately needed was a small income so that she could stop living dayto-day and starting a life for her and her children - who she longed to be reunited with. Aline's life turned a corner when she participated in a community workshop with Christian Aid trainers. Her group learned how to establish steady incomes, save for the future and borrow money to kickstart small businesses. Aline says 'I came out with amazing knowledge and skills. The trainer restored a sense of hope and energy in me'. As a result of this support, Aline set up as a grocery wholesaler and eventually earned enough money to rent a house. Her three eldest sons now live with her in a safe and happy home.





Mike Moir was at Burnside on 30 January to describe his trip to St Kilda in May 2023. Mike and three friends sailed from Harris to the main island, Hirta (an extinct volcano) where people had lived. The population peaked in the 17 century, but in 1930 the last remaining islanders left for the mainland. It was a hard life, catching birds (their feathers were the main export). Dead birds were stored in cleits (stone houses with turf roofs). Eggs were buried in ash to preserve them. Bonfires were lit to summon help from the mainland.

On 13 February members learned about the Guild project UNIDA (Hear our Voice) which trains women for ministry in Brazil.

Our main fundraiser event this session was the annual quiz night with Mike Moir as our quizmaster. Eighteen teams took part and an excellent sum of £709 was raised. We are most grateful to everyone who contributed in any way to the success of this venture.

The last talk of the session about the new Perth Museum was ably presented by Katy Jack. Many of the exhibits have been hidden from view due to lack of space but they will now be on display along with the Stone of Destiny. Visitors will also be able to purchase goods from the museum shop and enjoy refreshments in the cafeteria.

The AGM was chaired by Mike Moir on 26 March. The existing committee was re-elected and members were invited to submit nominations for two new members. Betty Elliott, who has resigned, was warmly thanked for her loyal service to the Guild.

The session has ended but we look forward to the afternoon tea at Brown and Blacks on 11 June.

Children's Story - Sin

Are you good at spelling? Spell "Mississippi" - a famous river in America. At the mouth of the river when it flows into the Gulf of Mexico, stands the city of New Orleans. In 1884 there was a Great Exhibition in New Orleans, Brazil sent a display of plants and flowers. Among them were twelve Water Hyacinths. These are tropical plants with beautiful lavender coloured blossoms. When the Exhibition was over, people took them home and planted them in streams and ponds.

But there is something very unusual about these plants. They spread and spread - fast! Twenty plants became 1,310,720 plants in just eight months! They spread into streams, creeks and bayous. A bayou is their name for a little bay; they say "by-yoo". The plants covered the water. Fish died from lack of oxygen. Muskrats, whose furs are valuable, died too. Ducks and Geese could no longer feed. Boats stuck in the thick mat of plants.

They called in the Army Engineers who look after the Mississippi Waterway. "We'll fix it!", they said. They cut it with a scythe - no good, it went on growing. They fitted cutters on boats and chopped it up - no good, tiny pieces simply grew into new plants. They used dynamite but that just scattered the plants still further. They tried arsenic poisoning - the hyacinths loved it and grew fatter and bigger than ever. The best they could do was use a new machine which minced the plants. It helped but some plants were difficult to reach.

The Bible tells us about something very like the water hyacinths. It does great damage. It spreads. It gives endless trouble. It is very difficult to remove. It is called sin. There is only one way to get rid of sin - God's way. God sent Jesus to take away sin. He did it by his life and death and resurrection. When we take Jesus into our lives, he forgives our sins and helps us to live as God wants.

Malawi



Fiddes Lungu moved to Nkhata-bay in pursuit of a better life. But in 2022, tragedy struck as a fierce storm destroyed her home, and took the life of her son.

Overwhelmed by grief, Fiddes considered suicide, feeling the weight of losing everything. Following a number of failed suicide attempts, her marriage began to unravel.

Hope arrived through the Family Scripture Engagement Packs by the Bible Society of Malawi. Selected as a benficiary, Fiddes received a Bible and a Bible Study Guide. Initially hesitant, she embraced the materials, and her life took a transformative turn.

Immersing herself in the scriptures, Fiddes found solace in 1 Peter 5:7: 'Cast all your anxiety on him because he cares for you.' Trusting in the Lord, her suicidal thoughts waned, replaced by newfound inner peace.

I no longer cry as I used to, Fiddes shared, her eyes reflecting resilience. 'My family has been brought together because of this Bible. If not for the Bible, I would have committed suicide by now'. The Bible saved my life.

Fiddes' testimony illustrates the transformative power of the Bible. It also shows the critical role your financial support makes in providing hope and healing to those desperate to read God's Word in their heart language.

Our colleagues in Malawi are working hard to provide Bibles for those most in need.

John Crighton (15/05/39 to 10/02/2024)

John was born in Elgin on 15 May 1939 and spent his childhood there where he developed his love for fishing, sport and the great outdoors. He completed a degree in Civil Engineering at Aberdeen University. While there he joined the Air Squadron and got his pilot's licence. At university he met his future wife Lorna.

His first job was in Argyll working for the County Council and then in 1964 he moved to a new job with Perth County Council. That year also he was to marry Lorna. Needing a new permanent home John and Lorna decided to buy a plot of land in Scone. John was to proceed to design and build the new house in Lynedoch Road in Scone. All this happened while working full time. The house took two and a half years to complete plus some blood sweat and tears. John's role with the Council was designing roads and bridges. He also found time to invent things. His ideas were patented for board games, flexible traffic cones, and interlocking retaining wall blocks. Two of his block designs are still in use 30 years on.

Outwith his council work John was active in a range of sporting activities – member of tennis and squash clubs and coaching in both, playing golf, table tennis and badminton, member of a bridge club, and white water canoe club.

John was a long standing and well respected member of the Congregational Board of Scone New Church for many years. He also became involved in the management of Robert Douglas Care Home in Scone deploying his management and practical skills, again over an extended period.

When John retired from his council job summers were spent visiting favourite places with the caravan, and spending more time with his 4 grandchildren. He continued being active with sport and developed a passion for gardening.

In 2012 John was diagnosed with Parkinson's Disease and over time simple tasks became more difficult.

In 2020 John and Lorna sold the house in Scone and moved to Balerno.
