
Stanborough Lakes

Hi Charlie,








We set up a schedule for single elimination matches. The first matches took place on Wednesday the 7th of December. We're still yet to find out who is the ultimate table tennis champion!



Mobile Phones Banned at School in the North of England!

Students protest outside of Southover School about a ban on the use of mobile phones.

A crowd of Year 11 and 12 students went on a strike outside their school building in response to a blanket ban regarding bringing mobile phones to school. They didn't attend their lessons and refused to do so until their voices were heard. Over 500 of these students signed a petition in order to urge the head teacher to lift the ban.

The head teacher refused to meet with the students and claimed that the reason the ban was enforced was, "fair and reasonable", believing that mobile phones are a distraction, resulting in lower academic achievement, and that they can provide a "breeding ground" for cyberbullying.

However, the students believe phones can be useful as they help some pupils to learn, particularly those with learning disabilities. They claim these phones can be used to set reminders regarding homework and could prove invaluable should there be an emergency, for example, an accident.

Finally, these young adults believe they should be given the chance to demonstrate the benefits of mobile phones being used productively during the school day. They have urged the head teacher to meet with them in order to discuss this matter further.



Our Trip to The Sky Garden

On Friday 18th December, we went on a visit to the Sky Garden; this trip was part of my Bronze Arts award in photography. We got off the tube at Bank and began to walk to the Sky Garden. As we walked we took lots of different photos of various buildings from different angles; we also made use of the natural light, taking some photos of buildings that were bathed in natural sunlight, while for contrast, we took snaps of objects that were partially shaded. A little later, we made our way to the Sky Garden which offers excellent views over the city. We had to go through airport style security before taking an express elevator up to what felt like another world. The views were breath-taking, providing a 360 degree view of our capital city. This is a great spot for photography. We took snap shots of some of the most famous buildings in London: The Gherkin, The Shard, The BT Tower, The Elizabeth Tower, The London Eye, Tower Bridge, Tate Modern and Saint Paul's Cathedral.



After taking photos in the Sky Garden, we then focused on the actual gardens. In order to take a good photo of the plants, I had to position myself and the camera at ground level in order to capture the variety of Mediterranean and South African plants. Among the flowering plants, I photographed were an African Lily, a Red Hot Poker and a Bird of Paradise. Later that day, walking through Leadenhall Market, we soaked up the atmosphere of a busy workspace. The Market is a vibrant, intriguing, iconic place to visit where we photographed the Victorian built arches which were designed many years ago. I would thoroughly recommend studying photography as you will visit cosmopolitan and sophisticated places of interest.
