Dear Friends,

I asked the group who met together for Bible study last Wednesday, how Lent was going for them. We had a good chat about the spiritual and personal changes they had made or were making as well as some of us owning that we hadn't really acknowledged the season at all. I did point out that weekly Bible Study was actually an acknowledgement because it took time and commitment. For a few it's also a long time in the café between service and study and I see and appreciate the effort.

Of course, not all denominations make a great thing of Lent. It is not a Biblical thing but a time that some churches, Anglicans and Catholics in particular, set to one side for prayer, reflection and contemplation, and penance. Sometimes, these things mean we are called to action; to give up, take up or to change ourselves. So how is Lent going for you? What have you done? What are you doing? What will you do?

I find one of the most useful aspects of Lent for me is the expectation that God will work in me during the season. I am sure he works in me all of the time, but I find it helpful to have a focussed period that enables me to read something new, create a new discipline or habit or simply to reflect on me as a child of Christ, as a disciple and as a teacher and leader.

One of the things my own Lenten contemplation has illuminated in me is a real fault and failing. I realise that very often I say, 'I will do that' and I don't. I have noticed that some of you expect me not to do things now and so either lose heart, get someone else to do it or avoid asking me at all. It's not easy to watch genuine surprise on a person's face when I do what I have said I will.

There are numerous reasons for this. Forgetfulness and too many things to do being just two of the reasons or you might say excuses. The question is, having become very aware of the problem, what is the solution? What do I need to do about it?

Remember when Jesus speaks to the woman caught in adultery and asks her, 'Has no one condemned you?' They have all gone because once challenged by Jesus regarding their own sinful life, they realise they are not righteous enough to stone the woman. She replies, "No one, sir," and Jesus then says to her, "Then neither do I condemn you...Go now and leave your life of sin." John 8. 2-11. Repentance and recognition of our faults and failings is but the first half of becoming a disciple. The next part is always to commit that sin no more. Sometimes it takes many attempts to stop committing a particular sin, always it will take our life's work to be made holy (Paul calls it sanctification). The important point is that we go on trying.

I have seen the problem. Now I am doing what I can. It may take me some time! I am writing things down more and checking back with my notes. I am making more lists, which I have always done to some degree, but which sadly requires me to remember whatever so that I can write it down. Harder as you get older! I am saying 'I will do it' to fewer things – in other words 'No'. I also have more brain space now that the excruciating pain I had for the fist part of last year, has gone. And there are so many bits of life to sort out which will happen bit by bit. If you would, you can help me in several ways. You can remind me, especially if the job I should be doing for or with you, is time specific. You can be kind and not expect me to remember anything you ask me to do just before or just after a service, unless it is specific to that event. Instead, email if you can or message me or as a last result call me and leave a message if I can't answer. I also want to reassure you that it is never personal when I forget something I am doing for or with you. It is mostly a me problem and one I am determined to tackle.

I continue to pray for you and wish you well as we begin to look towards Jerusalem,

It also helps me to have your contact details. You are entitled to be on the roll if you are baptised (in any recognised Christian Church) and live within the Parish or attend the church regularly. If you are not on the roll, ask for a form or look on the table at the back of church.

A note about regular donations and Gift Aid

Do you give regularly using a white envelope or by cash into the plate? Would you consider paying by standing order instead? All you need to do is fill in a standing order form (available at the back of the church) and take it to your bank. If you bank online you can set up the payment online direct to the church bank account: HSBC sortcode **40-15-04** account number **10183334** name of bank account: **Bromborough PCC**. You are in control of what you send. You can change the amount, up or down (but we hope up!) You can pay weekly or monthly.

The funds will come straight into the bank account. If you are a Gift Aider, we can automatically tag your donation to claim Gift Aid.

Please note: we are delighted that so many of you are using the tap to give device to make donations. However, if you are a gift aider, when a payment comes through from the device, we do not know that it was you who made a payment and we therefore miss out on your gift aid. Perhaps you could send an online payment instead? Or set up a standing order? We can see that the donation is from you, and we can tag it for gift aid. If you have made donations on the tap to give device that we could claim gift aid on, please let me know. I need the date and the amount. I don't need to tell anyone else if that is a concern for you.
