Dear Friends.

'Alleluia Christ is risen', the minister says. 'He is risen indeed. Alleluia' the congregation reply. So is the response that we share on Easter day and for the seven weeks after that form the season of Easter in the church's calendar. Just as lighting the centre candle on the advent ring at Christmas fills me with excitement, I never cease to have a child-like joy at these Easter words. Part of the reason is of course that we save the words for a special festival. When I was little, for a while, I tried to recreate Christmas every day. I would sneak upstairs and find the decorations and get them out. I loved Christmas and I didn't want it to end. My dad had to explain to me that part of the reason it was so special was that it didn't happen every day. To my parent's relief, I soon stopped trying to decorate everything after school.

Another thing that was true when I was small was that you could only buy Easter eggs at Easter. That included Cadbury's creme eggs. Now you can get eggs for about 4 months and creme eggs all year round – and they are smaller! Times change. People change. But the truth at the heart of Easter is the same yesterday, today and forever. Christ died for us because of his great love for us. Christ defeated death so that in the face of something that still scares people, we have hope. This life has joyful moments, if we are willing to seek them out, but when Christ comes again, we will have no more pain, no more tears, no more suffering. Through faith in Jesus, we are promised eternal life in a world that is



perfect just as God intended. We are also promised a different way of responding to the world we are in now. When



we move forward in faith, we do not tackle life's struggles and difficulties alone. We have Jesus with us and we are strengthened by the Holy Spirit who lives within us. Hard stuff doesn't stop but we are better equipped to go through it.


At the heart of Christianity is Christ's death and resurrection. Anyone who has ever worked with the Samaritans will tell you that one of the important and protective factors that a person needs to move forward in life is hope. The resurrection gives us hope. Where some may put their hope in winning the lottery, Christians put their hope in Jesus. The world is broken, people suffer, and awful stuff happens. I am thankful that the gift of faith which I have received enables me to navigate difficult times with a profound sense

that in the end, all will be well. This is not always an easy road to travel but the longer I have lived the more I see and experience the truth of it.

There is one other significant difference between the celebration of Christmas and Easter. Christians are sometimes referred to as an 'Easter people.' Every Sunday we celebrate the joy of the resurrection. We are reminded that we have been called into faith so that we can go out and 'Shine as a light in the world, to the glory of God the father.' We get to celebrate weekly. Sometimes I think that we forget that.

Whether you have been able to come and be part of the Church this Easter Sunday, or for a variety of reasons have stayed at home, I pray that you will hold fast to the hope that is set before us.

May God bless you richly. Alleluia Christ is risen ...

The Electoral Roll

Our huge thanks to Lesley for her work on this (with a little help from Clive). She has kept us up to date and curated the list of names. For health reasons, Lesley is standing down and the PCC have decided that the task will now sit with Fiona Austin. The Electoral roll is a list of the names and details of all those who are eligible to vote at the APCM (Annual Parochial Church Meeting) More practically, it affects the number of people on PCC (Parochial Church Council) and whether you can be on the PCC or not. It also helps me to have your contact details. You are entitled to be on the roll if you are baptised (in any recognised Christian Church) and live within the Parish or attend the church regularly. If you are not on the roll, ask for a form or look on the table at the back of church.

We need a name - can you help? We have had a few good ideas.

Thanks to the now 6 people who have come up with ideas for names (including someone in Cyprus) Anyone else? As the work we do to feed and support families in our area grows, we need to have a name that we can call it. Food for Families or Feeding families no longer seems adequate or entirely encompasses all that we do and hope to do moving forward. It could be a title that references a person, event or place in The Bible. It might be a phrase from a prayer – Daily Bread springs to mind but it's common. It could be a mixture of key words connected with what we do e.g. love, serving, compassion, feeding, support, help. I have been looking and thinking. Sadly there are several Barnabas projects (though we don't have to be original). What do you think? What is God whispering in your ear or shouting in your head? Drop me a text or email. It's fairly urgent as we would like to begin to use the name on our web pages and when we apply for grants. It will operate under our charity number so no change there. A note about regular donations and Gift Aid

Do you give regularly using a white envelope or by cash into the plate? Would you consider paying by standing order instead? All you need to do is fill in a standing order form (available at the back of the church) and take it to your bank. If you bank online you can set up the payment online direct to the church bank account: HSBC sortcode **40-15-04** account number **10183334** name of bank account: **Bromborough PCC**. You are in control of what you send. You can change the amount, up or down (but we hope up!) You can pay weekly or monthly. If The funds will come straight into the bank account and if you are a Gift Aider, we can automatically tag your donation to claim Gift Aid. If you have made donations on the tap to give device that we could claim gift aid on, please let me know. I need the date and the amount. I don't need to tell anyone else if that is a concern for you.
