### Dear Friends

Going to Uganda has really re awakened my heart to the needs of women not just here in our country but all around the world, we only need to watch the news to see how they struggle. But what is amazing is that also all around the world women are helping women just where they are, with actions that we hardly hear about.



While in Uganda I was asked to speak to a women's ministry group attached to the church situated in the grounds of the school. A couple of these women gave testimonies that would break your heart, but the hope was that in the sadness of their lives they were being taught and supported by the other women in their group. They in turn are planning to go to other women in their communities to help them.

The verses I opened were from Johns Gospel Chapter 19:25-27

<sup>25</sup> Near the cross of Jesus stood his mother, his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Clopas, and Mary Magdalene. <sup>26</sup> When Jesus saw his mother there, and the disciple whom he loved standing nearby, he said to her, "Woman, here is your son," <sup>27</sup> and to the disciple, "Here is your mother." From that time on, this disciple took her into his home.

As I looked around, I saw women who mother others just like Mary the mother of Jesus, women who need others just like Mary Magdalene and women who support others just like Mary wife of Clopas. And all these women in turn who mother the church.

Ladies I wonder who are you at this moment?

As we know, we move from one to the other throughout our life.

So what can we do to support each other,? On Sunday 16<sup>th</sup> June Rev'd Ross opened the word from Mark 4:30-34. Part of the scripture said this:

'With what can we compare the kingdom of God, or what parable will we use for it? <sup>31</sup> It is like a mustard seed, which, when sown upon the ground, is the smallest of all the seeds on earth. <sup>2</sup> Yet when planted, it grows and becomes the largest of all garden plants, with such big branches that the birds can perch in its shade."

The needs of the world overwhelm us but what if we could focus our ministry being there for each other and seeing where God leads us.

I would love us to be like a mustard seed in Gods kingdom, women coming together to support women, growing into something that would reach out to others. I wonder if you would pray for this to be so.

# Getting involved, the antidote to apathy

Hi Folks!

Lots happening at the moment.

The General Election, of course: just three weeks to go.
Also the French elections provides continuous copy for our

incredulous media. Then Taylor is just down the A59, filling Anfield for three consecutive nights while **Swifties** overwhelm the city.

The Olympics, of course, are about to loom out of the mist while this evening the Euro's kick off in Munich to Gaelic acclaim.

However, if the truth be told I'm not overwhelmed with excitement.

Sadly the General Election campaign is becoming a **Vote for us and get a free microwave** campaign. And when it comes to Taylor Swift I am firmly in the category with Judge James Pickles who at the height of Beatlemania wonderfully asked: "Who are the Beatles?"

The Olympics, of course, I will enjoy – as long as Team GB wins medals. And then the Euros: Will I be able to cope? My heart has been broken so many times. Do I have the willpower to put myself through the wringer once again?

Which finally brings me, after six paragraphs, to the presence of apathy in our culture. **A**-, which is the negative prefix in Greek, and **pathos** which means emotion. That is, **Not-feeling**, Not wanting to get involved.

Mind you, as a vicar and also chair of the Governing Body I soon learned that people only attend Annual General Meetings when things, as they see it, are going pearshaped. When things are going well, no one turns up apart from those who have to.

Sadly the temptation is to encourage apathy in order to ensure a quiet life. No one likes being held to account by the awkward squad. And yet as athlete Chris Long points out: "For all the evils in the world, I think apathy is one of the most dangerous."

There was an excellent article on Apathy in Wednesday's *Times*: Apathy in the UK isn't so bad for democracy, by James Marriott. His argument? "Don't look down on the less well informed: our electoral system wouldn't work without them."

He makes the point that we are overwhelmed with information. I can well remember the time – I'm sure you can - when to know the news, you had to wait. Either for the morning paper to arrive or for the next BBC news bulletin. Even worse when you were abroad on holiday, reading yesterday's news from an overpriced newspaper.

Nowadays we are overwhelmed with information, news, gossip, fake-news and rumour. Which strangely doesn't help but simply bolster our prejudices as we choose our sources and inhabit our own echo chamber.

As Christians, as disciples of Jesus, we need to break free of our algorithms and face up to facts we find uncomfortable. It's not a bad discipline to read newspapers with a different world view than our own, something that I personally find difficult.

But there's wider picture here regarding how we think and find our place in the world.

Fundamentally, Christians do not fear suffering, even our hearts being broken again. I remember thinking 46 years ago, just days after my ordination, thinking that if I was going to thrive in ministry, I would need to handle disappointment. The following day few people turned up for our Saturday workshop.

So how do we handle disappointment?

Knowing that God seems to prefer to work through our failure and weaknesses, such as the apostle Paul's thorn in the flesh (whatever that was): 'But (the Lord) said to me, "My grace is sufficient for you, for my power is made perfect in weakness." Therefore I will boast all the more gladly about my weaknesses, so that Christ's power may rest on me.' (2 Corinthians 12:9).

So we do not fear coming last (unless it is the Ormskirk Parkrun) nor being laughed at nor disparaged. "Let the world deride or pity, I will glory in Thy name." This refusal to be intimidated gives us a resolve and resilience to get stuck in.

I know it was over two centuries ago but I am still in awe of the persistence of William Wilberforce who presented a bill in the House of Commons for the abolition of the slave trade every year from 1789 to 1807 until he succeeded. That's political courage in the name of Christ.

Moreover, as Christians we reject selfishness. Me-first soon becomes Only-me. We get involved because we realise the importance of community, and here Christians have a strong track record, be it in running foodbanks or caring for neighbours.

Last week you may have noticed was the **Big Help Out**, to encourage people to volunteer, to get involved. The reality is that many of our voluntary societies were

started by Christians to meet a particular need while it is well documented that Christians are more likely to volunteer, to get involved.

So what's God saying to you? The chances are that when you think "Someone should do something about that!" God is challenging you to do it.

Or there again, you can stay at home and watch Netflix.

# **CHURCH COLLECTIONS**

Here at St Mark's we are blessed in that previous generations have provided us with a financial cushion which means that although our offerings fall well short of our necessary expenditure we can continue to function, maintain and improve our Church.

Nevertheless, it is now up to us as God's people to recognise that we have a responsibility to use our time, talents and finances in His service to ensure that there continues to be a Christian witness in our community.

Scripture says 'We should set aside an amount each week according to our income' (Corinthians 16 V2) to be used in His service.

We have ceased to use numbered envelopes. There were very few people using them and in addition a person's taxable situation can easily change.

The best way to ensure regular giving is by setting up Standing Orders at the bank, our bank details are at the end of this article or if preferred I have the forms that can be handed into your bank.

The next best way is to use the Gift Aid envelopes which are in the pews or I can supply you with a number of them. Full details only need to be used at the first time of using after that just a name will do.

Loose offerings on the collection plate are very much respected and required but there is a limit (£8000) over which we cannot claim a Gift Aid rebate.

It is now possible to give digitally, thank you Stuart, by using the Sum Up modem at the rear of Church and the QR codes located on the back of each pew.

If you are a taxpayer it is preferable to use the QR codes as we can then claim Gift Aid. We pay a commission of about 2% when using both digital methods which brings us back to using Standing Orders where possible.



Also in May, we welcomed Stéphane, one of our supporters, and a sponsor of one of the children at Reaviva. His visit was a touching reminder of the positive impact that every act of solidarity can have on the lives of those we support. We thank Stéphane for his continued support and commitment.

Additionally, we carried out a meaningful initiative in partnership with the NGO Sou Grato, dedicated to supporting people experiencing homelessness. Together, we organized a self-care morning, as well as painting and singing workshops.

To conclude the month of May, we celebrated I.V.'s 10th birthday with a delightful party!





**Community Market:** We're starting to see exciting changes and deeper relationships opening up. Prayers for this would be much appreciated.

**FOSTER FAMILIES:** In May, we celebrated World Foster Care Day and were invited to speak to the employees at Patteo Shopping Centre. We have started the 6th training course for new foster families. Currently, there are 4 registered families and 2 under evaluation. We ask for prayers for two sisters who were in the process of bonding with a couple interested in adoption. 

**Lych Gate** (A definition From the Illustrated Dictionary of British Churches)

A covered gate, usually at the entrance to a churchyard. The term lych evolved from the Saxon word for corpse, and the lych gate was traditionally a place where corpse bearers carried the body of a deceased person and laid it on a communal bier. The priest would then carry out the first part of a burial



ceremony under the shelter of the lych gate roof. Lych gates are usually of wood, and thus subject to decay. For that reason many are fairly modern reconstructions of much older timber covered gateways. They are traditionally roofed with wooden or clay tiles, or thatch.


