Dear Friends,

Today as I write this letter, it is June the 18th 2026. A lot of tragedy has happened around the world : I don't need to name them for you to know we are not in a good way.

These events are so newsworthy because of their horror and because of the amount of people involved. But as we all know illness and death that does not make news headlines is all around us. It is easy to get really miserable and depressed isn't it?

These things were going through my mind when I received an email from TED. (technology, entertainment and design) it is an internet online facility that lets you watch high quality speakers give talks on all kinds of subjects. The speaker I was encouraged to listen to was a lady called Anne Lamott, who writes books about life, issues and Christianity. She is about 72 years now and when she was 60 she wrote what she felt were twelve truths, the last truth she wrote down was that of death. This is what she wrote, see if you agree.

"Wow and yikes. It's so hard to bear when the few people you cannot live without die. You'll never get over these losses, and no matter what the culture says, you're not supposed to. We Christians like to think of death as a major change of address, but in any case, the person will live again fully in your heart if you don't seal it off."

Like Leonard Cohen said, "There are cracks in everything, and that's how the light gets in." And that's how we feel our people again fully alive. Also, the people will make you laugh out loud at the most inconvenient times, and that's the great good news. But their absence will also be a lifelong nightmare of homesickness for you. Grief and friends, time and tears will heal you to some extent. Tears will bathe and baptize and hydrate and moisturize you and the ground on which you walk.

Do you know the first thing that God says to Moses as they meet? *He says, "Take off your shoes." because this is holy ground,*

Ram Dass (An American Spiritual Teacher) said

It's hard to believe, but it's the truest thing I know. When you're a little bit older, like my tiny personal self, you realize that death is as sacred as birth. And don't worry — get on with your life. said, "When all is said and done, we're really just all walking each other home."

What if we all owned that truth in these times of such unrest that we can be with each other, just as Jesus commanded : caring and being, and just walking each other home.

You know I used to say God loves us all the same, but I have realised that is not true, God loves us all uniquely, in His eyes none of us are replaceable, each one of us is distinctive and individual, something we realise when we lose someone we love, no-one can take their place.

As Psalm 139 says we are all fearfully and wonderfully made and the bible also tells us that when God created humanity he saw that it was good.

In these dark events I have mentioned, people will be asking where is God, how could a loving God let these things happen?

But in these dark times we have also seen the light shining through. In the brokenness and sadness there has also been a real goodness shown by strangers: kindness, generosity, support, love, gentleness and courage.

St. Paul calls them the fruits of the Holy Spirit (Galatians 5:22). This is called grace: something given without being asked or expected, just as we live in the grace of God. It is what changes us, heals us and heals our world, and it is this grace that we show and see in others that will, even though things seem daunting, give us faith in life and each other, but ultimately in God's love for us, shown to us through Jesus the Saviour.

I pray that you have a wonderful summer

Even groans count

Hi folks,

What does it mean to pray for someone?

Clearly this was a key priority for the apostle Paul, who seems to be praying for lots of people all the time. For example, he writes to Timothy: "I am grateful to God ...

when I remember you constantly in my prayers night and day." (2 Timothy 1:3)

But he also expected others to pray for him. So he asks the Christians in Thessalonica: "Finally, brothers and sisters, pray for us, so that the word of the Lord may spread rapidly and be glorified everywhere, just as it is among you." (2 Thessalonians 3:1)

For those first disciples, mutual prayer support was critical. In this they were simply following Jesus' clear example, as he prayed for individuals. To Simon Peter he says: "But I have prayed for you, that your faith may not fail."

Jesus models intercessory prayer. But for me, the question is: how?

I've been pondering that this week as I seek to obey Jesus and prioritise prayer. I remember something a vicar in East Twickenham said when I was there on placement as an ordinand all those years ago. When you spend time in prayer each morning, he said, that is the most important thing you will do that day — especially on those days when nothing much seems to have happened.

Nowadays, in retirement, I've developed a daily routine. I begin with a Psalm and then my Bible reading through BRF Guidelines. This prepares me for a time of intercessory prayer — praying for others. Over the years I've developed a fairly structured pattern using prayer diaries and different themes for different days of the week.

It all sounds very holy. In reality, it's often quite matter-of-fact — rather like putting the bins out on a Tuesday evening. And, as you might expect, there are days when it all feels rather hollow.

"You call that prayer?" says the devil. "Yes," I reply. "It's in the name of Jesus. I'm just doing what I'm told."

But how do I pray for individuals?

On Tuesdays, for example, I pray for all my former curates and their families — around 15 names in total. For some I know quite a lot about their current situation; for others I may be several months out of date. So often it is simply a name.

The same happens in church intercessions. At many of the churches where I help out, I'm given a list of perhaps twenty names. If I'm honest, it can sometimes sound like a roll call or even a shopping list — one name after another with very little detail.

Does that count as prayer?

There is always a temptation to add more words. Instead of simply praying for James, I find myself wanting to say: “Bless James richly with all the resources of heaven. Guide him by your Holy Spirit. Protect him from all the assaults of the devil ...” And so on, just spiritual mush. Or in the words of Jesus: “vain repetitions.”

But can I simply pray for James by name and leave it there? After all, God knows James infinitely better than I do. As Bishop Gene Robinson helpfully observed: “God doesn't need me to remind God of what God already knows. God doesn't need to be briefed.”

Going back to shopping lists, I'm always amazed by how quickly the self-checkout scanners work. Sometimes I barely pick up an item before it has already been recognised. In a fraction of a second all the information is there.

How much more for God - he knows our needs in an instant?

The moment we bring someone before him, he already knows everything there is to know about that person. We have simply spoken their name. Just like that.

I recently read a book on prayer by Rowan Williams. He says prayer may be as simple as repeated words such as, “Lord, have mercy,” or “God, come to my aid.” Then he adds: “Sometimes ... it's the end, too. Most of us never get much further than that.”

And remember, God is committed to helping us pray. As Paul writes in Romans 8:26, paraphrased in *The Message*:

“Meanwhile, the moment we get tired in the waiting, God's Spirit is right alongside helping us along. If we don't know how or what to pray, it doesn't matter. He does our praying in and for us, making prayer out of our wordless sighs, our aching groans.”

In God's economy, even groans count. So adding a name is a bonus,

I find that deeply encouraging. On those mornings when my prayers feel thin and my concentration wanders, I can still bring people before God. I may not know what they need, and I may not know what to say, but I can say their name. And that is enough.

Decide now. Take one person, speak their name before God, and leave them there. You may feel you've done very little. But in faith you have placed them into the hands of the One who knows them, loves them, and cares for them far more than you ever could.

J. John, born John Ioannou, is a British evangelist, minister, speaker, broadcaster and author. He has been in ministry for four decades. He has spoken in towns, cities and universities in 69 countries often at large-scale events and conferences.

J. John has written over 60 books since 1988, and there are more than one million copies of his books in print worldwide. He has also contributed articles to various news journals and media outlets,

J. John was born in London, on June 2, 1958, to George and Helen Ioannou. His Greek name Ioannes Ioannou, translates as "John John". He studied psychology at Hendon College from 1974 to 1976 and became a Christian in 1975.

He worked as a psychiatric nurse at Napsbury Hospital in St Albans, England, before pursuing theological studies at St John's College, Nottingham, in 1978.

J. John began his ministry at the Christian Renewal Centre in Northern Ireland, engaging in reconciliation, mission, and prison work, moving on to St Nicholas' Church in Nottingham, overseeing evangelism efforts and speaking at colleges, youth events, and churches.

He is known for his dynamic speaking style, Christmas sermons, and practical evangelistic approach.

J. John's ministry emphasizes equipping Christians to share their faith naturally and engagingly. His teaching style combines humour, practical advice, and direct Bible-based challenges, making his messages accessible to a wide audience.

J. John lives near London. He is married to Killy and is a father and grandfather.

The History of St Mark's Church Scarisbrick



James Edward Pickthall

Vicar of St Marks 1924-1949

James was born on the 13th April 1871 in Bolton le Moors, the son of John Pickthall, a gardener, and his wife Ellen Ann, nee Rudge.

In both the 1881 and 1891 census he is living at home with his parents, and in the census he is listed as a cotton crofter.

His theological training was at St Aidan's College in Shrewsbury Road, Birkenhead. He was ordained on 23rd December 1894 by Dr Moorhead, the then Bishop of Manchester

In 1899 he married Harriet Elizabeth Wilson Egerton in the Holywell region (North Wales) and they had one daughter, Rita, born in Pleasley, Derby in 1900.

Prior to coming to Scarisbrick James was vicar in Aughton from at least 1911 when he appears there on the census.

Whilst in Scarisbrick he was particularly active in activities to raise funds and support for our armed forces during World War 2.



He died on 22nd October 1954 when he was living at 30 Heathey Lane Halsall.

His funeral was held at St Mark's Church on 25th October 1954.
