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The Festival

What is the MAX Diversity Film Festival?

The MAX Diversity Film Festival (MAXDFF) provides both amateur and professional filmmakers¹ with a place to showcase their voices, stories and experiences of migration - embracing diversity, discussing challenges, inequalities and discrimination, but also celebrating the power of multiculturalism and communities united in diversity.

Our goal is to empower individuals with a migrant background and multicultural initiatives to share their voices by telling their experiences in the first person, and to recognise their contribution, work and resilience. We want to enhance the representation of Europe's cultural and ethnic minorities in the society in which they live and to counterbalance the lack of visibility migrant people often have in the public sphere.

Whether finalists or not, all officially selected filmmakers will have their

materials and profile published and disseminated by the MAXDFF platform and the MAX project and consortium media channels.

This film festival is a unique opportunity to celebrate diversity in Europe, to present previews of films or a selection of movies little known to the public, and, through storytelling, to contribute to the creation of an evidence-based debate and narrative about migration.

MAX is an AMIF-funded project aiming to change public attitudes towards migrants.

Its goal is to improve the public image of migrants in Europe by changing the narrative around the immigration discourse and putting the stories of real people centre stage.

Why do we organise it?

Well-managed migration to Europe contributes to our societies, culture and economy. The integration and social inclusion of people with migrant refugees and asylum backgrounds, seekers is crucial for cultural exchange, economic development, fighting against demographic downward slope and community cohesion. It also helps address skills gaps, labour shortages, and to boost economic performance overall. Currently in the EU, too many migrants face challenges in terms of discrimination, unemployment, no recognition of certificates and diplomas, lack of educational and opportunities, language barriers and limited social interaction with other local communities². European societies are,

and will continue to become. increasingly diverse. Notwithstanding the efforts and progress made, many thirdcountry nationals across the EU continue to fare worse than EU citizens in terms of employment, education, and social inclusion outcomes³. Today, around 34 million inhabitants were born outside the EU (around 8% of the EU population) and 10% of young people (15-34 years) born in the EU have at least one parent born outside the EU⁴. A dynamic two-way process on integration means not only expecting third-country nationals to embrace EU fundamental values and learn the host language but also offering meaningful opportunities participate in the economy and society

The online MAX Diversity film festival is a film event taking place over several months where after a call for participants and preselection by a jury, the public can watch the film selection through an online platform and vote for their favourite one per category. After the voting, MAXDFF will announce the winners during an Award ceremony which will count with the testimonials and experiences of the film makers, the members of the jury and other keynote speakers.

society. The promotion of intercultural dialogue, of respect for human rights, and of European values is essential⁵. Effective migrant integration needs to fully engage the different stakeholders and so requires migrants, EU citizens of migrant origin and hosting communities to be empowered in the process.

A recurrent theme in the discussion of societal integration has been the lack of visibility and representation of migrants in the society they live in.

The film festival is a unique opportunity to celebrate diversity in Europe, present previews of films or a selection of films little known to the public and contribute to the creation of an evidence-based debate and narrative about migration through storytelling. This initiative aims to promote culture and support cinema at a time when the COVID-19 crisis has heavily impacted on the sector.

Who can apply

Eligibility rules

Please make sure you have read the following instructions before participating

- MAXDFF DOES NOT REQUEST participants to submit their films directly to us but instead, you are kindly asked to send us the LINK where you have uploaded your film, on YouTube or VIMEO
- The link should allow watching the film that is competing in MAXDFF and must be open to the public to be part of the evaluation, voting, award ceremony and public online screening until at least December 31st 2021.
- Films must be uploaded in HD, up to 10 GB, .mp4 or .mov format are recommended. We recommend you use the following settings:
 - Maximum video bitrate:
 2200 Kbps, H.264, mp4
 - Audio: 128 Kbps, AAC, 2 channel stereo

- Aspect ratio preserved;
 video height of 1080 pixels
- All entries must focus on migration stories, topics or issues connected to migrants in the European Union (see section <u>Categories</u> for more information)
- For the purpose of this festival we understand the term migrants as people born outside an EU country, or descendent of parents born outside an EU country, and who currently live in any EU country
- Participants need to be at least 18 years of age
- Films must only be submitted by individuals with the legal right to negotiate the use of the work
- Entries can come from any country in the world as long as they focus on migration stories and realities connected to an EU country
- All films must include English subtitles



- Participants may submit any number of entries in any number of categories, but a separate online entry form is required for each
- Entries can include either new films that have not been broadcasted in other festivals before or films that have been broadcasted and/or participated in other festivals in the last 5 years (entries from 2016 to 2021 are eligible)
- Participation is free. No fee will be charged to participants submitting an entry
- Participants need to fill in all the mandatory fields of the submission form and submit their film selecting the category in which they want to participate within the period established for it.
 Entries received after that period,

- or not following the submission format, will not be considered
- If selected as a finalist,
 participants are requested to
 submit a short video of 1'30'' 2'30'' presenting their film to the
 audience. These videos will be
 part of the promotional
 campaign and voting process
 open to the audience.
- Participants authorised MAXDFF to place their name, image and metadata of the film (title, category, year, synopsis, summary) in the MAX project YouTube Playlist, website, social media and related promotional materials as well as to record them during the MAXDFF award ceremony (see section <u>Contact</u> <u>and Legal notice</u> for more information)



Categories

MAXDFF is divided into two general categories: amateurs and professionals, that are at the same time split into two subcategories, short and long films. In addition, and Audience Award will be offered to the film that receive the most votes from the audience among those that did not classified as finalist



Amateurs

MAXDDF is committed to provide nonprofessional filmmakers and students with an opportunity to showcase their production to a wider audience.

We understand amateur filmmakers as being those for whom filmmaking is a hobby or part of their studies and who do not earn their main income from film making. Filmmakers whose previous film productions have never won an award at another film festival can also compete in this category.

Professionals

We understand professional filmmakers as being those for whom filmmaking is the main part of their professional activities or whose previous film productions have been selected for inclusion in other film festivals.

Within these 2 competition categories, there are the following subcategories:

Short film: 2 categories - amateur and professional

Films in the form of short video documentaries or testimonials that portray different aspects of the migration journey, or the contribution migrants or intercultural activities run with or for migrants make in different fields (intercultural activities, sport, labour market integration, education and training, entrepreneurship, social inclusion, empowerment, etc.). Short animated films are also welcome within this subcategory!

• Length: from 10' to 30' minutes



Tales of migration - Long film: 2 categories - amateur and professional

Films presenting narrative long-form fictional or real stories, such as a personal migration story which may show the challenges and opportunities of the journey or integration process. Suggestion: Long form films may focus on various contributions migrants make to society, the struggles they have faced and the solutions they have found. We also welcome submissions that focus on communities and community projects related to migration.

Length: from 40' to 1h 30'

Audience awards

The aim of the **Audience awards** is to disseminate as much as possible about all the raising awareness films received so that the audience can get to know better all the MAX Diversity Film candidates that participated but that were not preselected by the jury.

All the eligible participants not preselected and thus being part of the final competition of the 4 categories awards run during the month of October 2021 and published under the secretion VOTING, will be displayed in the section ALL FILMS. In parallel to the voting of the finalist, a communication campaign and online screening will be conducted for all those candidates and the one receiving the most votes will receive the Audience awards during the ceremony on the 5th of November 202

The MAX project will make the films available to the audience and will launch a Europe wide communication campaign

public vote on the MAXDFF page and the vote by the members of the jury, with each group weighing 50%. Online presentation/short screening sessions will be organised during the month of October with the finalists to allow the audience and jury members to get to know more about the films and the authors

Evaluation and award ceremony

All candidates will be evaluated by a panel of judges selected by the MAX project after the project has verified that all the eligibility criteria for participation have been met.

The jury of the MAX Diversity Film Festival will be formed by members from different cultural, educational and ethnic backgrounds, including women and men of migrant background, communication, professional filmmaker and migration policy experts.



Jury evaluation and voting

The verification of the eligibility criteria process will be done by the MAX project team in charge of the MAXDFF.

All the eligible candidates will be then evaluated by a panel of judges selected by the MAX project. The jury will select the finalist. In a second stage, the finalists will be announced and the public will be able to vote for their favourite under each category in the website the MAXDFF will make available for it. For a fair and transparent competition, the MAXDFF public voting system only allows one person, one vote. That is:

- 1. The user can vote for her/his favourite film under each category on the web.
- 2. The user receives an email to confirm the email address.
- 3. By clicking on the email, he/she will return to the web, and there the user will receive the confirmation message.

The final ranking will be determined by combining the public vote on the MAXDFF page and the vote by the

members of the jury, with each group weighing 50%.

The jury of the MAX Diversity Film Festival will be formed by several members of different cultural, educational and ethnic backgrounds, including women and men of migrant background, communication and migration policy experts.

The evaluation done by the panel of judges will be based on the following key principles

- Originality/creativity: The uniqueness, originality and imagination in the story presented in the submissions. Use of innovative techniques, images, representations, topics.
- Performances/characters: Quality
 of the performance, acting of the
 characters, relevance of the
 interviews or portraits of the
 animated characters (applicable
 depending on the category).
 Representation of the
 personalities that are distinctive,
 compelling, multi-layered, with
 clear and active goals.



- Plot: How the actions, events, conflicts, and turning points that shape the story forward are unfolded.
- Pacing & Structure: The framework and timing of the film, script and actions. How the elements of the plot and the character evolve during the film towards the end. Effective and logical progression of the story.
- Sound/music: Clarity of the dialogues. Use of appropriate music to the theme and story of the film
- Writing/dialogues: Quality of the dialogues and voice-over. Use of natural, concise and unique voices for each character.
 Appropriate use of language for each character and moment in the story. Or, proper and effective use of lack of dialogue.
- Entertainment value: The story's ability to hold the viewer's attention. Is it fun, attractive, or thought-provoking?
- Diversity awareness message: The film effectively communicates a message about diversity in the European Union, it portraits a personal migration journey, challenges, inequalities or discrimination, and integration process, multicultural activities embracing diversity or the positive contribution that migrant

communities bring to the new home societies in Europe.

After the preselection of the finalist in September, all films will be online screened in the MAXDFF page and MAX YouTube playlist for the public watch&vote period.

Online presentation/short screening sessions will be organised during the month of October with the finalists to allow the audience and jury members to get to know more about the films and the authors. The winning films will be announced at the Online MAXDFF Award Ceremony on 5 November 2021.

Finalists and winners will present their work and debate with the large audience about the stories and inspirations behind their productions.
