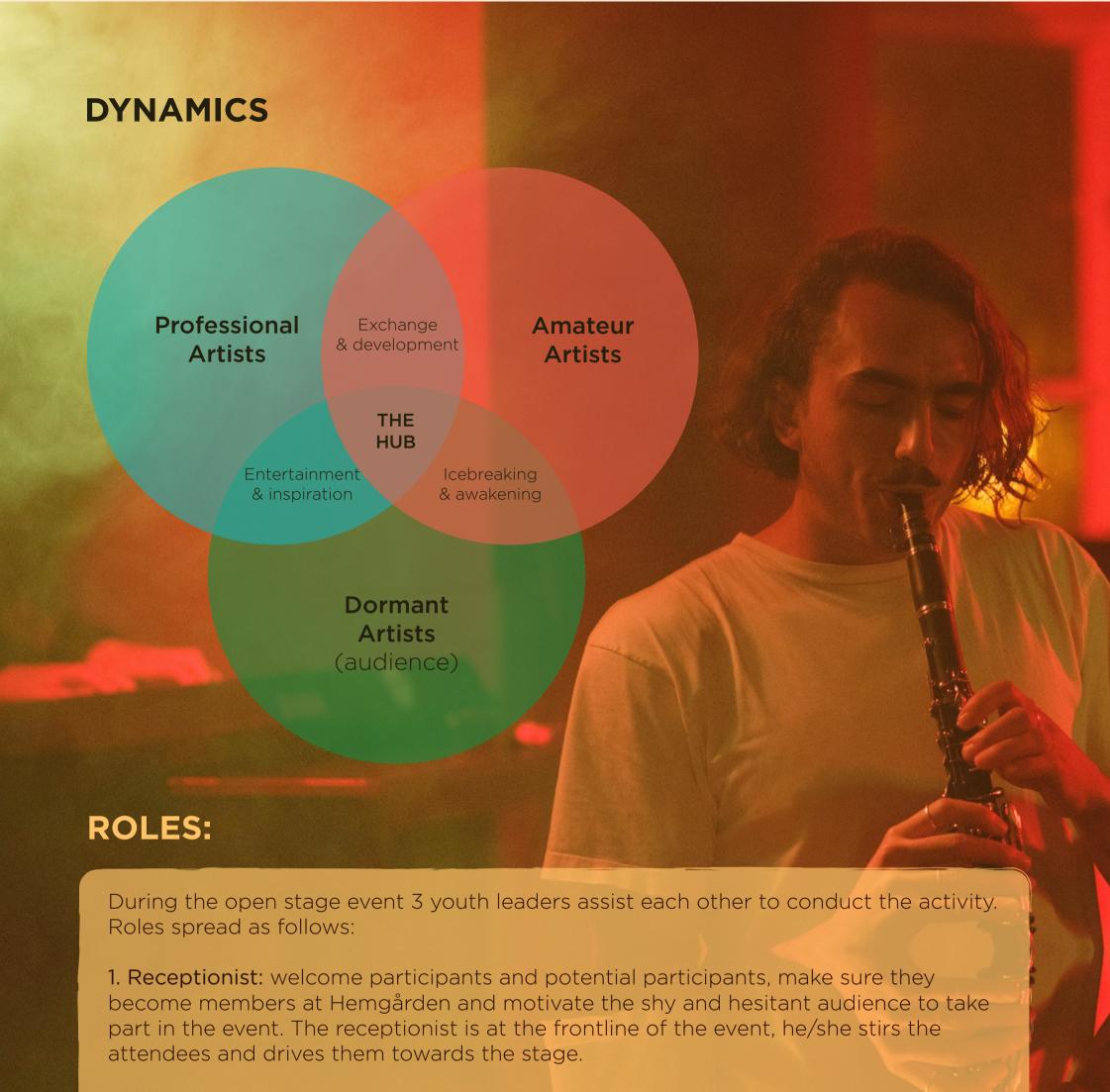




Stemming from this realization, the HUB was developed to bridge both of these worlds and create an intimate interactive space of musical and lyrical expression with no strings attached within a scenical setup. A sort of rehearsal, jam session and open mic session yet in the frame of a concert.

In addition, the democratization of art has brought to the world generations of creative individuals that seldom find a chance to perform on a stage or in front of an audience. The Hub is a non-formal stage that helps new artists contextualize their artistic efforts.





- 2. Coordinator: animate the session, break the ice with the participants, arrange and program the different sessions and participants list, come up with thematics and initiate ideas around which a jam could evolve. DJ and play instruments.
- 3. Technician: sound and light control and adjustments, co-animating the session, filming, recording and broadcasting live on social media if possible.

Roles are interchangeable between staff during breaks.

This chart points out the future challenges of attracting a more balanced palette of participants in terms of gender to the project.
