

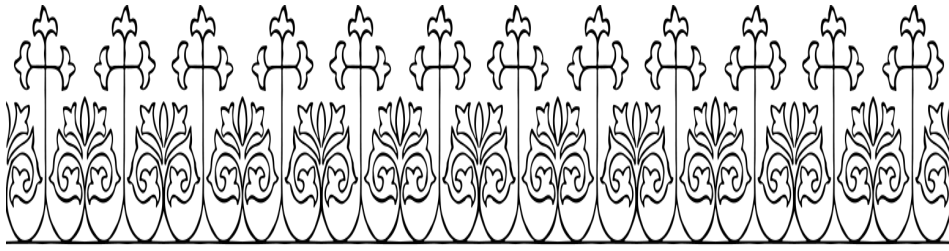

In this late summer edition of 2022, as we face a challenging and uncertain future, it is tempting to focus on the many negative issues that dominate the news: the virus that is still with us, the war in Ukraine that still grinds on, the ever more urgent climate emergency, the rising prices that diminish our wages, the drought, war and climate changes that may lead to food shortages around the world... I could go on.

But 2022 has also brought with it an incredible technological marvel with the successful deployment of the James Webb Space Telescope. As human beings we have evolved to a point where we are able to reflect on our existence and seek meaning and purpose in our lives. What does a meaningful life look like?

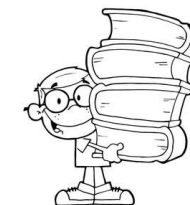

Doynton and Wick WI: July has always been our Mystery Evening. This year, members ventured out to Box, near Bath, where local historian Claire Dimond Mills provided maps and questions for a walking quiz around the village. A delicious supper followed, and a good time was had by all. At the August meeting, Dr Amy Frost of Bath Preservation Trust gave a fascinating account of the life and strange works of William Beckford (1760–1844), the traveller, writer and art collector who built the famous golden tower on Lansdown, Bath. William's father and grandfather made a fortune with their sugar plantations in Jamaica – thanks to the sweat and blood of countless slaves, as Amy reminded us – and William promptly spent it all on paintings, sculptures and a Gothic country house at Fonthill in Wiltshire. When the money finally ran out, he downsized to Lansdown Crescent in Bath, with a back garden running all the way up the hill to the site of his new tower. A true British eccentric.

In July the challenge was to cut down on food waste.

Thanks to those who joined the community litter pick on 23rd July. Many sacks full of rubbish were collected and the village looked smarter



RECYCLE-We know about recycling plastics etc. Remember Freecycle at the Village Hall on Sat 3rd.

REUSE- rather than throw away, which includes **REPAIR**- a bit of glue, a screw or two. Get a trades person in to repair rather than buy new.

This month let's focus on **REDUCE**

Reduce our electricity bills by turning off things on Standby- it could save an average household nearly £150 per year. <https://www.bbc.co.uk/news/technology-61235367>

Less time having a shower reduces electricity use. And using less electricity reduces CO2 emissions.

Reduce the amount of red meat we eat. Beef production in particular results in more CO2 and Methane, contributing to global warming, than other meats and vegetables. We can have a lovely, healthy diet with less red meat.
